#### I. CALL TO ORDER

Linder called the meeting to order at 12:00 pm

#### II. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Grimm moved to approve the agenda. the motion was seconded by Smith.  
Passed with a unanimous vote.

#### III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Smith moved to approve the May 8, 2019 meeting minutes. The motion was  
seconded by Grim, and passed with a unanimous vote.

#### IV. OLD BUSINESS

##### A. Alcohol Policy

Hollis stated staff is planning an interested parties meeting, potentially a world café style, regarding the proposed drink specials regulations. This would potentially allow for changes to the draft ordinance. From there it would go through a public hearing and then to City Council for consideration. Hollis reminded the commission of the request from council person Trapp regarding door person/security/bouncer training. He said that the commission could report on CPD current and previous CPD efforts in this area. Hollis also stated that this topic is covered in the SMART Training, which is the primary training used to meet the server training requirement. Masters stated that they could do a three part training series with the DOT. She said that fake id's aren't as prevalent in the college age students. Most of them have an older friend or family member buy them alcohol. Smith asked about the new SEC changes. Masters stated that she had given feedback to the SEC about this policy change, and they had taken a lot of those recommendations when forming the language. She said campus was planning to have alcohol sales in effect by this football season. It is still under review at MU, but it is finalized at the SEC level. Linder stated there will be a bar owner meeting this summer, probably in August. Hollis stated the drink specials regulations interested parties meeting is being planned this summer.

### B. Opioids

Linder stated at this time the data does not reflect college level students using opioids. Hollis stated that the third wave of the opioid epidemic is a spike in the use of fentanyl, much of which is coming from China. He said the Sheriff still says that Meth is a major problem. He also said that PHHS is trying to get Narcan directly in the hands of consumers. Linder stated that state-wide PDMP did not get passed this legislative session, but is already being worked on for next session. Eisenbeis stated a concern about a PDMP is that the bad actors will go underground, which will make them potentially harder to catch. Roelands said there are major restrictions on providers writing prescriptions for opioids now, and some insurance companies aren't paying any for opioids anymore. Eisenbeis said the pharmacists are glad to have the PDMP, so they aren't taking all the heat. Roelands stated some pharmacies now have disposal boxes available, even without state funding.

### C. Medical Marijuana

Hollis stated DHSS rules and regulations are published. Linder stated Council approved a 500 ft. limit. Willoughby stated that there are no restrictions on cultivation and manufacturing. Linder discussed the hoops that had to be gone through to change the zoning restrictions for existing spaces. Mondloch asked what a diagnosis would look like for a patient. Roelands stated the patient would fill out an application and the physician would certify the patient has one of the conditions which could be almost anything. She was wondering about how to handle her DEA license and had reached out to an OBGYN in Colorado. Linder stated that companies outside of Missouri, which are already financially backed and have knowledge of the industry, are looking to invest in Columbia. Linder stated applications are due to the state in August we would probably not see an impact to Columbia until spring of next year for the dispensaries.

Hollis stated the City's social services funding process is changing from switching from a three year cycle to a two year cycle. Mental health and independent living will be moving under basic needs. Children, youth, and family will be moving under opportunity. This change should result in the ability to be more adaptable and tell a clearer story. Hollis stated Mu submitted a NIH grant to further the work of decriminalizing homelessness and mental illness. The grant funds would be used to hire a justice system coordinator and two social workers. There was a discussion about the challenges of addressing these issues without Medicaid expansion.
