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#### I. CALL TO ORDER

Lindner called the meeting to order at 12:03 pm

#### II. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Smith moved to approve the agenda. Mondloch seconded the motion and it passed with a unanimous vote.

#### III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. Smith moved to approve the April 14, 2021 draft meeting minutes. Roelands, seconded the motion and is passed with a unanimous vote.

B. Lindner had everyone briefly introduce themselves to the new commissioners.

#### IV. OLD BUSINESS

A. Alcohol Policy— Lindner stated there was not much new to report at this time. Regarding door person training, Lindner stated Partners in Prevention is willing to add a door person module to the SMART training. Hollis stated the Commission could report to council that Partners in Prevention has added an optional door person module to the SMART program versus changing the requirements and ordinance. Lindner said she would work on a draft report to share with the commission. Lindner provided the website [mopiptraining.org](http://mopiptraining.org). Lindner stated at the State Legislature House Bill 517 and Senate bill 283 were set to go to vote. These would preempt any local ordinances regarding Tobacco 21.

B. Opioids— Hollis stated he had spoken with Sandra Miller, social services supervisor at PHHS, who continues to coordinate mental health providers for the pandemic response, regarding opioid usage and overdoses. Miller relayed that the provider stated there seems to be an increase in usage and over doses, but there are no hard numbers yet to compare. Mondloch and Hollis had been in communication with the hospital association about opioid overdoses, but their cases are all self-reported so they aren't completely comprehensive. Lindner stated the State Legislature passed PDMP as of yesterday and as long as the Governor signs it, it will become law.

C. Medical Marijuana—Perkins has no updates from CPD. Hutton stated MU is preparing to deal with the increase in usage of marijuana on campus. Linder stated there is a push across the nation to go "back to the basics" of prevention and harm reduction as we emerge from the pandemic. She stated PIP will focus on what a basic drink is, what alcohol poisoning looks like, and how to help someone in crisis.

D. Vaping— Hollis asked the commission if they should keep vaping on the agenda. Hutton stated the data from Eliminate Tobacco suggests a small dip in usage which may be short lived. Rowe stated the statewide data is not yet available and the NSF data from 2020 is low compared to 2019. Hutton is anticipating an increase in nicotine usage among college students in the fall. Consensus of the commission was to remove vaping from the agenda and add it in as needed.

## VI. REPORTS

A. ADAPT-Hutton stated ADAPT had changed their name to MIZPIP. They continue to work on a strategic plan for fall. Their main focus is on substance use and mental health for the campus.

B. Youth Community Coalition (YC2)- Rowe stated they are continuing with the "You Card, We Care" program in the community. Rowe also wants to address the ease of access minors have to drive up alcohol sales. Lindner stated House Bill 517 could determine how the commission could move forward with concerns. Rowe stated YC2 will continue their education and prevention efforts.

C. Columbia Public Schools---no one to report

D. Staff Report—Perkins stated CPD had been increasing underage drink enforcement in the downtown area and east campus area. Hollis stated PHHS is still responding to the pandemic.

## VII. GENERAL COMMENTS BY PUBLIC, MEMBERS AND STAFF

A. Hollis stated the commission could meet quarterly rather than monthly. After discussion, Mondloch moved to change the monthly meetings to quarterly. Khanna seconded the motion and it passed with a unanimous vote.
