Re: Public Hearing related to the Proposed Replacement and Installation of Additional Security Cameras in City-owned Parking Garages

Executive Summary

A public hearing is being held for the proposed replacement and installation of additional security cameras in all city-owned parking garages at a cost of \$249,418. An Interested Parties (IP) meeting was held on March 26, 2019 at City Hall.

Discussion

In 2017, Kenton Brothers Systems for Security was awarded the City contract to replace the physical access control systems in all city-owned facilities. As the Parking Utility planned and budgeted to upgrade and replace security cameras in the parking garages, the Information Technology department recommended that Public Works utilize this same vendor in order to support the City's long-term plan of converting all cameras within City departments to a centralized IP system, making it easier to share digital information that is captured through the cameras.

City staff has worked with Kenton Brothers to develop a scope of services to include:

- Converting analog camera systems to an IP system which will allow for a clearer video image, centralized staff access to video footage and increased security for all City-owned parking garages.
- Add cameras to the entrances and exits of all garages to support the transition to an automated payment system.
- Add cameras to the top level of the 5th and Walnut Parking Garage for increased surveillance opportunities.

The proposed project locations are: 10th and Cherry, 8th and Cherry, 6th and Cherry, Short Street, 8th & Walnut (Plaza) and 5th & Walnut parking garages.

Staff hosted an IP meeting for this project on Tuesday, March 26th at 5:30 pm in Conference Room 1B of City Hall. Three people signed in and all were supportive of this project. The sign-in sheet and comment forms are attached. Installation of the cameras is expected to begin in late spring/early summer of 2019.

Fiscal Impact

Short-Term Impact: The cost of the project is \$249,418 and is being funded from the FY2018 Parking Enterprise funds allocated for an FY2019 Parking Capital Improvement project.



Long-Term Impact: Annual maintenance of the cameras is estimated to cost approximately \$43,000/year and will be budgeted in the Parking Utility on an annual basis.
