Traffic calming wouldn't bother me if it were implemented.

I do NOT support traffic calming being installed on Bray Avenue. **Comments** (additional space for more comments on the following page) I completely understand residents of Bray Avenue wanting to reduce traffic on the road to make it more safe to back out of their drive ways, safety for their children, and reduced noise, I am not certain that numerous speed humps and intersection speed tables are the solution. I would suggest that after living in the area for over 27 years and using Bray on a daily basis, the solution may be to raise the awareness to the speeding situation for all people in the neighborhood. Perhaps signs, street markings, crosswalks, and choking devices would be a reasonable first approach to solving the problem. I don't think that we need to jump all the way to a highest stage of calming devices. I am aware of only one accident recently on Bray which was an elderly person hitting a parked car. I think this is a pretty good record for a street as highly traveled as Bray is. Please consider this cautious approach to the Bray situation and look for a graduated and reasonable approach rather than rushing to judgment and elevation to drastic measures. If nothing else this will save the City money. If in two years, more drastic measures are needed, then take that action then. 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I do NOT support traffic calming being installed on Bray Avenue. **Comments** (additional space for more comments on the following page) Thank you for allowing us to comment on the situation related to Bray Avenue and traffic calming devices. First I would like to say that I agree completely with comments provided in December 2020 from Brandon Slama and from Judge Robert Aulgur. They provided thoughtful and reasonable comments that conveyed a graduated response to the situation rather than rushing to the highest stages of calming devices. I have lived in the neighborhood for 27 years. During that time, I can say that I use Bray Avenue daily. Many others in the neighborhood do also. During that time frame I have not seen any substantial traffic incidents occuring on Bray. The only risk I feel is turning onto Fairview and even there, I am not aware of many or perhaps any incidents during the 27 years. I want to solve the problem that residents on Bray have regarding noise, backing out of their driveways and general safety issues. But I don't think that adding 5 types of humps in the road is the solution. I encourage a graduated approach to the issue. Let's let the neighborhood know safety is an issue with signs. Why not alert motorists to be considerate of their neighbors backing out of their driveways and slow down to help them out via signs? Perhaps cross walks at key intersections to make people more alert? Road markings or choking devices along the road? My wife and I are very concerned about the number of calming devices planned for this very short length of road. Would you let me know where there is an example in the city of the number of calming devices such as planned for Bray Avenue? I have not been able to find anywhere that would have such a concentration.

Having lived in the area on Dublin avenue for 27-years we are very concerned about the safety for everyone in the area. We are now interested in understanding the need for such intensity of traffic calming devices. Has there been a rash of accidents on Bray Avenue recently? How was this level of calming developed?

Would you let us know of other similar examples so that we may research areas before we make our final comments prior to the deadline of June 25th.

Some other questions for consideration:

- 1. Are there other traffic calming alternatives to these speed bumps and speed tables?
- 2. How many people have petitioned for traffic calming devices?
- 3. Would a completed sidewalk on the north side of Bray to Fairview help in safety issues?
- 4. Will the introduction of these measures increase traffic on other streets in the area as motorists avoid Bray and the concentration of calming devices?
- 5. You indicate this plan was developed with input from people between November 30 and Dec 11, 2020. Would it be possible to know the number of people involved and where may we see the comments from this meeting?

We appreciate trying to make our neighborhood safe for everyone. We want to make sure that there is no rush to find an easy solution that may cause more trouble in the long-term.

Les and Ann,

Thank you for reaching out regarding the Bray Avenue Traffic Calming project. Here are a few examples of recently completed projects which include speed humps spaced similarly to what has been proposed for Bray Avenue:

There has been one crash reported on Bray Avenue in the last few years. However, crashes occur randomly, and one of the best ways to address crashes is to make systemic changes to the transportation network. The objective is bring operating speeds closer to the posted speed limit of 25 mph. At 25 mph, the chances of a pedestrian and vehicle crash resulting in serious injury or death is greatly reduced. In general, speed hump/speed table spacing should be around 400 to 500 feet to provide consistent operating speeds on the roadway. The spacing on Bray Avenue is about 475 ft. between each device due to driveway arrangements and intersecting streets.

- 1. There are alternatives to speed humps. These can be found in our Traffic Calming Guidebook.
- 2. There were 11 people who signed the petition for traffic calming. This meets our threshold of ten people. Most petitions do not have many more than ten people because this number meets the minimum requirement for entrance into the Neighborhood Traffic Management Program, and begins the process to pursue a project for traffic calming.
- 3. Completion of the sidewalk network on the north side of Bray would be beneficial. However, this is outside the scope of the traffic calming project. The objective of our traffic calming program is to lower operating speeds on neighborhood streets to reduce the risk of fatalities or serious injuries when crashes do occur. Vehicle operating speeds along Bray are consistently around 42 mph. At these speeds, any crash between a vehicle and a pedestrian would be likely to result in a serious injury or death to the pedestrian.
- 4. There may be some increased traffic to other streets in the neighborhood, but this would be expected to be minimal due to the layout of the neighborhood and the fact most traffic is local. If there is a significant change to traffic patterns, this could be addressed with a future project.
- 5. We received comments from about 21 people during the first Interested Parties Meeting, and I have attached those comments to this email. Letters inviting the public to participate in the first IP meeting were sent to the same residents who were sent letters for the second IP meeting, and a press release was sent out notifying the public of both meetings.

I do NOT support traffic calming being installed on Bray Avenue. **Comments** (additional space for more comments on the following page) My wife and I have lived off Bray Ct on Dublin Ave for 28 years and drive Bray Ave daily. We've not seen a much of speeding problem on Bray and definitely not Bray Ct. If there is, it's likely just during morning and evening commutes. The most notable change has been increased pedestrians accessing the Scotts Branch Trail, especially at the Cunningham and Weaver intersections. A better solution would to install pedestrian cross walks at those intersections and also repair/improve sidewalks to reduce pedestrians walking within the street. We also believe the placement of the proposed five (5) structures to be excessive for the type of neighborhood collector (not a through street) and the street length. Additional Comments

Placing five (5) traffic slowing structures is excessive for this road length and type for the following reasons:

- 1) Bray is a subdivision collector and not a through street, traffic on this road is only the residents and any associated service providers.
- 2) The proposed five structures on about a 0.6 to 0.7 mile stretch will be too close to each other, about 0.12 miles spacing. The placement of these type of speed humps on other though streets, like West Stewart and Rollins, have spacing of 0.2 to 0.25 miles.
- 3) Bray Ave has hills creating natural blinds spots, the speed humps could potential increase risk of vehicle incidents if not correctly placed for visibility.
- 4) As neighborhood collector, Bray Ave has a fair amount of street parking, unlike most through streets. This helps somewhat regulate speed and flow.
- 5) Most people hate driving over these structures and avoid if another route is possible. These restrictive road structures (five in about 0.7 miles) will result in the unintended consequences by diverting traffic to other neighborhood collector streets, such as Cunningham and Jake Lane. This will just create traffic and safety issues in other locations.

I do NOT support traffic calming being installed on Bray Avenue. **Comments** (additional space for more comments on the following page) While I support traffic calming efforts on my street, something needs to be done to reduce vehicle speeds while also not creating problems like increased noise or interfering with access to side streets or private driveways. Few home owners will want a speed hump/table at the entrance to their driveways or in front of their homes on a quiet residential street. Has research been conducted that demonstrates the effects of an installation of a speed hump/table on the property values of the residences most immediately impacted? As was mentioned in the first round of public input, the amount of traffic on Bray Avenue is concerning. The number of vehicles using the street seems to be far in excess of the neighborhood residences in the University Park subdivision. It appears that Bray Avenue and Cunningham Road are being used as through-traffic routes to access other subdivisions in the area. Bray Avenue and Cunningham Road were not designed to support a volume of throughtraffic. The amount of traffic currently observed on Bray Avenue creates an unsafe condition for residents, especially children. Options to prevent though-traffic should be explored by the city during this traffic calming process, which might include partial or full closures of certain intersections. *The personal information request below is not required and could be made available to the public.* David J. 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I do NOT support traffic calming being installed on Bray Avenue. **Comments** (additional space for more comments on the following page) I live at 1225 Jake Lane. We already experience high traffic from vehicles taking a short cut to Cunningham. If Bray traffic is "calmed", drivers will simply cut through to Cunningham off Bray using Jake Lane. Jake is the only other cut through for drivers avoiding the stop sign at Fairview and Chapel Hill. Drivers have also figured out that they can bypass Bray when traveling south on Fairview and take Middlebush, then they do a rolling stop at Jake and speed to Cunningham then to Chapel Hill. There's no "calming" solution without affecting other streets in the subdivision. Speed bumps might reduce traffic in the subdivision some but they alone won't deter drivers completely. Speed bumps plus speed limit reduction to 20 mph along Bray and Jake and other streets might do the trick. But, Como drivers know that speed/traffic enforcement in Como is non-existent.
