

STRATEGIC PLAN Focus group report

Dear Members of the Vision Commission,

I am happy to transmit this report of findings collected from community focus groups conducted from December 2018 to January 2019. The focus groups gave their thoughts, opinions, and perceptions about Columbia for the purpose of the next strategic planning process. The report fulfills one aspect of the public engagement process mandated for the Columbia Vision Commission in Sec. 2-303, City Code:

"Sec. 2-303 (c) Public engagement: The commission, through various means, will collect public input on the strategic and relevant plan initiatives and departmental goals. The commission, in preparation for its annual report submitted to the city council, will hold at least four public hearings for public comment on the current state of city initiatives and collect public feedback."

The City Council enacted this mandate May 7, 2018 in Ordinance B92-18, which coincided with City staff's realization that key input was missing from our strategic planning process: the voice of the customer, Columbia residents and businesses. With the help of a contracted professional consultant, Vision Commission members, and an internal Strategic Plan Planning Committee jointly designed and conducted a public engagement process. The focus groups drew nearly 140 interested residents and businesses to eight focus groups, each with a priority to hear different perspectives. This included people who identified to be part of one or more of the following groups:

- Low-income households
- Seniors
- Youth
- Businesses
- Persons with disabilities
- Three groups for the public at-large

The Strategic Plan Planning Committee is comprised of City staff members, including Stephanie Browning, Todd Guess, Sara Humm, Leigh Kottwitz, Megan McConachie, Toni Messina, Lelande Rehard, Rebecca Roesslet, and New Chapter Coaching staff Carolyn Sullivan and Jessica Macy. As the Committee's coordinator, I want to thank all Committee members and focus group participants who contributed to this work. I especially want to recognize Rebecca Roesslet, with the Columbia/Boone County Department of Public Health and Human Services, for analyzing the public input in this report.

Finally, I want to thank the Vision Commission members for your foresight in identifying the need for public input, asking the City Council to make it part of your mandate and participating with the focus groups. I could tell that you were excited to engage with community members.

It is my hope that this report will enhance knowledge of priorities expressed by focus group participants and assist the Vision Commission and City Council in making informed decisions. Working together, I am confident we will reach our vision to make Columbia the best place for everyone to live, work, learn and play.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of Columbia hosted eight focus groups as part of its next strategic planning process. Focus groups were used to gather the thoughts, opinions, and perceptions of Columbia from its two customer groups: residents and businesses.

The focus groups were conducted between December 2018 and January 2019 by members of the City's internal Strategic Plan Planning Committee and the Columbia Vision Commission. The internal group, as well as other City staff, facilitated eight focus groups with a total of 138 residents and/or business owners participating. Upon completion of data collection, preliminary results were shared with the Strategic Plan Planning Committee. Focus groups were evaluated by participants and process improvements were implemented as appropriate.



OUR PROCESS

In August 2018, the City's internal Strategic Plan Planning Committee was formed with the objective of developing the process for completing the next Strategic Plan. The internal group membership includes internal City staff as well as external consultants. The group reviewed the City's previous two strategic planning processes (2012-2015 and 2016-2019) and noted that although the results of the annual citizen survey were considered in the Strategic Plan, there were no additional opportunities for residents and businesses to provide input until after the plan was finalized and presented to City Council. As a process improvement, the planning group decided to host focus groups, with the aim of providing qualitative data to inform the next Strategic Planning cycle. These focus groups were in alignment with the mandate of the Vision Commission, which was directed by the City Council to engage the community for the City's next Strategic Plan.

A focus group is a small group of participants that responds to a set number of questions. Questions are openended, leading to group discussion on topics of importance. Participants react to ideas together and can build off of each other's comments. Only a small number of people can participate in focus groups, usually 10-15, so all voices have an opportunity to be heard. There is a risk of the group atmosphere hindering honest opinions if some people are uncomfortable speaking up when their opinion is different than the majority. This methodology is a good complement to the data acquired from the annual citizen survey.

The design of the focus group was completed after a series of meetings of the Strategic Plan Planning Committee. Five focus groups were planned, with each of the five intentionally advertised to customers that may not have engaged in other methods of citizen input. These five groups included: low-income households, seniors, youth, businesses and persons with disabilities. These focus groups were completed in December 2018. The Committee later added three additional focus groups to be open to the general public. These three focus groups were completed in January 2019. The Strategic Plan Planning Committee provided logistical support for the execution of the focus groups.

Recruitment methods varied by group. Stakeholder groups, such as Services for Independent Living, Central Missouri Area Agency on Aging, REDI, City of Columbia Office of Sustainability, Family Health Center, and the Chamber of Commerce assisted with recruitment for low-income households, seniors, businesses and persons with disabilities. The youth focus group was conducted at the December 2018 meeting of the Youth Advisory Council. Social media posts and flyers were used to advertise and recruit for the three groups open to the general public.

Focus groups were held in public locations with ample parking, close to public transportation, ADA accessible, with appropriate space for children. Focus group participants were provided a meal, child care during the focus group and a \$25 gift card. In order to plan for child care, transportation, ADA accommodations and dietary needs, participants were asked to RSVP. The desired number of participants was capped at 15 for each session, although attendance exceeded 15 at several groups. Group size ranged from 13 to 21, with an average attendance of 17.

Focus groups were scheduled during lunch or dinner based upon the needs of the group. Each group had 30 minutes for the meal and 90 minutes for discussion. At most of the focus groups a Vision Commission member opened with an introduction and an explanation of the process. A City staff member explained the handouts

provided to each participant. Handouts included: the consent to participate (*Appendix A*), the demographic questionnaire (*Appendix B*), the list of discussion questions (*Appendix C*) and the focus group evaluation (*Appendix D*). The consent to participate was read aloud in English. Participants were asked to review and sign the consent before beginning the discussion. In addition to the discussion questions, participants were instructed to complete a 3 by 5 index card with their response to the following question: "Suppose you could make any change to the City you wanted. What change would you make?" These cards were collected at the end of the meeting.

The facilitator reviewed the ground rules and proceeded to lead the discussion. Ground rules were agreed upon for each session and posted in the room for participants to reference (*Appendix E*). Each focus group was audio recorded for data collection purposes. Members of City staff, the Vision Commission, and the external consultant served as facilitators and/or recorders. The role of the facilitator was to guide the discussion while the recorder captured the discussion answers on a flip chart.

Three questions were asked at each focus group:

- 1. If you were trying to get a friend to move to Columbia, how would you describe our community?
- 2. What are the most critical issues facing our community in the next five years?3. What is the most important thing the City can do for its citizens?

Each question was presented to the group, followed by three minutes of "brain writing" and 17 minutes of discussion. In order to conserve discussion time, participants were asked to vote on their agreement with a response. For example, if a participant said, "I think we have a lot of great parks" the facilitator asked for a show of hands from participants who were in agreement. The number of hands was then counted as responses. If five people were in agreement, then the comment "I think we have a lot of great parks" would be counted as a total of six responses (one original plus five in agreement). Votes were noted on the flip charts for accuracy.

Focus group results listed in this report are the comments collected during the group discussion, as well as those written on the 3 by 5 index cards. These comments are considered nominal, or categorical data, meaning data that can be named and put into categories and then counted *(Machin, Campbell, & Walters, 2007)*.

As mentioned above, focus group responses were collected on flip chart paper during the discussion as well as audio recorded. The audio recordings were transcribed (*Appendix F*) and then transferred to Microsoft Excel. In an effort to ensure data integrity, all focus groups were transcribed and analyzed by a Senior Planner with the Columbia/Boone County Department of Public Health and Human Services and reviewed by another Senior Planner for accuracy. Any comments omitted from the original transcripts were added in italics.

Each question was analyzed by location as well as a comprehensively. Responses to Question 1, "If you were trying to get a friend to move to Columbia how would you describe our community?" were both positive and negative. The negative comments were reasons why they wouldn't try to get a friend to move to Columbia. For the purposes of analysis, positive responses were listed as Question 1A, negative responses were listed as Question 1B. The responses collected on the 3 by 5 index cards are listed as Question 4 and are listed in the appendix *(Appendix G)*.

Themes in the focus groups were found by examining the words in the comments (i.e., the thoughts and suggestions from the focus group members written down by the recorder). The themes were found by identifying comments that shared similar words and did not include words that were common in other themes. For example, if a comment stated, "we should have more parks and trails," it would be categorized with other comments like "our parks and trails are great" rather than comments like "we have access to lots of specialists in the hospital system." Final themes were: City leadership, infrastructure, education, quality of life, oppression (race and class), health care, mental health and substance use, homelessness, housing, law enforcement, City communication, transit, human services, youth, business growth, economic mobility, public safety, managing for growth, other, and diversity, equity and inclusion (*Appendix H*). Each comment was assigned to a theme in Microsoft Excel and then counted. The themes can then be ranked by frequency, leading to results such as, "The number one thing Columbia can do for its residents is ___".

RESULTS COMPREHENSIVE FOCUS GROUP & DEMOGRAPHIC RESULTS


The responses from all focus groups were combined and analyzed. Listed below are the top three responses for each of the questions, along with examples of comments.


QUESTION 1 (Graphs 1, 2):

"If you were trying to get a friend to move to Columbia, how would you describe our community?"

Responses for this include both positive attributes of Columbia (Graph 1), which would be shared to convince a friend to move here, as well as negative attributes (Graph 2) that would be shared to discourage someone from moving here. The positive and negative attributes were separated into Q1A and Q1B for analysis. The most frequent response to Q1A (positive) was categorized as Quality of Life, which included parks, trails, arts, leisure, size, faith community, volunteerism and central location, to name a few. The second most frequent response was categorized as Education, which includes private, parochial and public schools, as well as the three institutions of higher education. The third most frequent response was Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion with remarks on the diversity of our city, the progressiveness of Columbia and a willingness to improve itself. The most common response to Q1B (negative) was Housing, which included a lack of affordable housing and poor quality of housing. The second most common response was Economic Mobility, due to a lack of jobs that pay a living wage and limited middle skills jobs. City Communication was the third most common response, which included a lack of community knowledge of available resources and programs.




QUESTION 2 (Graph 3):

"What are the most critical issues facing our community in the next five years?"

The top three responses were Housing, City Leadership and Public Safety. Note that Transit was one data point less than Public Safety. Housing concerns included a need for affordable housing, high utility costs, a need for universal design and too much focus on student housing. City Leadership concerns focused on the need to diversify revenue streams, replace the city manager and police chief, the lack of diversity in leadership and addressing the City's electric utility capacity, to name a few. Public Safety issues included an increase in gun violence, crimes committed by youth and drug sales.




QUESTION 3 (Graph 4):

"What is the most important thing the City can do for its citizens?"

The top three responses were City Leadership, City Communication and Housing. City Leadership comments included the need for the City to take action on the input it receives, transparency in decision making and operating and addressing systemic racism. City Communication comments included a need for inclusive listening practices, more opportunities for citizen input and more communication about City services. Housing comments included implementing a rental cap, assisting with utility costs and no longer developing student housing.


FINAL QUESTION (Graph 5):

"Suppose you could make any change to the city you wanted. What change would you make?"

These responses were collected on 3 by 5 index cards at the conclusion of the focus group. The top three responses were City Leadership (diversify revenue, transparency, changes to City Council), Transit (longer hours and expanded routes), and Infrastructure (crosswalks, aging infrastructure and bike lanes).




FOCUS GROUP DEMOGRAPHIC RESULTS


Focus group participants were asked to complete a demographic questionnaire. The intent was to ensure diversity within the focus groups. As previously mentioned, five of the eight focus groups were recruited from harder to reach populations (low-income households, seniors, youth, businesses and persons with disabilities) and three were open to the general public. Of the 138 participants, 133 completed the demographic questionnaire.


The majority of participants were female (66.2%). The largest age group was between the ages 45-54 (24.1%). Most participants were white (49.6%) and the largest ethnic group was non-Hispanic (90.2%). The most common educational level was a bachelor's degree (39.9%). The household income question was not answered by 27.1% of participants. The youth were not asked to report household income, attributing to the large number of participants without income noted. Listed below in Graphs 6-11 are the demographics for all focus groups. The 2017 American Community Survey served as the data source for Columbia's population.

Graphs 6-11: Focus group demographics












FOCUS GROUP GEOGRAPHIC RESULTS

Focus group responses were analyzed by location as well as comprehensively. Tables 1-8 list the responses, by question, for each of the eight focus groups. The data listed below is a count, meaning that each response was categorized and the categories were counted for frequency. Several of the comment counts exceed 100. This occurs when one respondent says "I think we need more affordable housing" and 25 people agree, this is counted as 26 in the category of housing. The next respondent says, "I think our utilities are too high" and 10 people agree, this is also counted as 11 in the category of housing, and so on. High counts reflect the different number of comments that were categorized under the same heading and agreed upon by the majority of the participants. The questions are listed as follows:

Q1A: If you were trying to get a friend to move to Columbia, how would you describe our community? Positive Responses

- Q1B: If you were trying to get a friend to move to Columbia, how would you describe our community? Negative Responses
- Q2: What are the most critical issues facing our community in the next five years?
- Q3: What is the most important thing the City can do for its citizens?
- Q4: Suppose you could make any change to the city you wanted. What change would you make?

DISSEMINATION OF RESULTS

Focus group evaluation results were regularly reviewed by the Strategic Plan Planning Committee for process improvements. This report and its accompanying results are being shared with the Vision Commission and the City Council, as well as electronically with focus group participants. It is available to the public on the City's website.

LIMITATIONS

Multiple limitations were identified in this process. Whenever possible, process improvements were implemented. Improvements included reading aloud the consent to participate, having additional supplies for unexpected participants, collecting votes during the discussion to address time constraints and editing the wording of the consent to participate to accurately reflect confidentiality.

Some of the focus group attendees did not RSVP. This presented challenges in planning for food, supplies and incentives. Group sizes were larger than ideal, which limited the ability for everyone to share their input equally. In an effort to address these time constraints, facilitators began asking for a show of hands to capture the number of participants in agreement with a comment. Although this assisted with data collection, participants may have been impacted by groupthink and voted in favor of a comment in alignment with the majority.



In several of the focus groups, attendees answered the first question, "If you were trying to get a friend to move to Columbia how would you describe our community?" with a negative response. These responses included statements such as "I wouldn't tell a friend to move here." or "I would tell them it's too expensive." This made it challenging for analysis, which was resolved by separating the responses into positive and negative.

The demographic questionnaire used in this process was adapted from a previous community engagement process. Not all of the questions asked proved to be useful for this project and are therefore not included in the analysis. Participation in the questionnaire was voluntary, therefore not all participants completed the form.

In an effort to learn from previous process limitations, as well as gaining perspective from individuals with disabilities, targeted outreach was conducted and attendees were asked if they need accommodations to remove barriers to participation in advance of the meetings. There continues to be opportunities to improve engagement with individuals with disabilities, such as ensuring the meeting space and materials are accessible for all participants. These accommodations include ensuring seating, tables, handouts and presentations (i.e., ASL interpreters, braille or verbal instruction), food and drink provisions are accessible for all participants.

EVALUATIONS

As mentioned previously, focus group participants were asked to complete an evaluation at the conclusion of each discussion. Evaluations were shared with the Strategic Plan Planning Committee for process improvement. Of the 138 participants, 111 (80%) completed the evaluation. An existing City commission was used for the youth focus group, therefore they were not asked to complete the evaluation. Focus group evaluation results are included in the Appendix *(Appendix I)*.

- The University has too much control over the medicine and they services provided. They absorb others. Will absorb Boone.
- Good place to start a business. The people who came and inspected the business were nice. Rents are a little high but if you want to start a business out of your house, it's very easy to get that going here in Columbia.
- As a new business owner, there are so many opportunities available for resources. You can get just about any help you are looking for.
- Start up costs are cheaper here
- Gas is cheap
- Doesn't take much to start a business here, people are helpful, you can find help starting if you know where to look. People are willing to help you get started.
- Public schools are good, top rated (in their opinion). Everyone has an opportunity to get a quality education in the public school system.
- Opportunities for private education
- Everything is close here, within 15 minutes
- Traffic is good compared to big cities
- Disagreement with comment about the public schools. Minority students, specifically African American males are marginalized, treated differently. It is done frequently and purposefully. I don't think that everyone has the same opportunities.
- Columbia public schools is one of the most racist school districts west of the Mississippi River. Since the Civil Rights act of 1964 was passed, they have complied zero years. In sixty years, there has not been one program that would foster and embrace the Civil Rights Act of 1964. I know. I was in the segregated

Columbia Public Schools and also the integrated Columbia public schools. The way the district treats black students in ridiculous. The way they treat black men as far as having their contracts renewed. If you stand, and be a man, your contract will not be renewed the next year. There is a lot of work that needs to be done there and instead of educating the children, black children are often misdiagnosed and placed in special or remedial programs just so they can get them out of the room.

- There is a comment that it is safer than most. I actually looked up the statistic because I wanted to make sure that I was correct. Columbia is 25% higher in crime than the rest of the country per capita.
- As far as that is, I think it's isolated and there are isolated incidents. I have been here all my life and I still leave my door unlocked and my windows open when I go to sleep. People say the street I live on "well I'm not coming over there, there is a lot of crime". If you get to know your neighbors and there is kids on the block and they all play with each other, then you can feel safe. But you can't isolate yourself and say "I am not going to talk to that person over there I see people running in and out of their house" you don't know what they are doing. But if you don't say "hi" you never will. You can't judge a book by its cover. So, that crime that has been happening here lately is by people who are not from here. They are people that have integrated here, running from other places. Columbia is in the middle of two big places so we are getting them here, thinking that they can come in here and take over and do whatever they want. Everyone says "if you come to Columbia on vacation you leave on probation". We don't play. So this is just a little spurt in crime incidents that we're having. It won't last a long time. It's not like St. Louis. It's not like Kansas City. It's not like California. I mean we do have our crime and if we can just get people to stop saying "snitches get stitches" and step up and tell what you see without thinking you are going to be the next one that's harmed, we'll be ok.
- I feel like there is crime everywhere you go. In a big city or small city. It doesn't
 matter if you leave your door unlocked and your windows open. If you give kids
 something to do starting at 25 to 13, there would be less crime. Period. Whether
 you are in the suburb or the city. If you target the youth, give them something to
 do.
- I found it to be the people are nice. Working is plentiful. Jobs everyone. School system is nice from what I have experienced.

- (2) What are the most critical issues facing our community in the next five years?
 - Housing costs are way overhead compared to what our jobs pay here
 - Medical costs could be a problem.

- Losing some of the supportive services. We all sit and talk about our families. Our homeless people are also part of our community so even with some of the programs. Losing food stamps because you don't have a job. We got homeless people who may be losing disability so now we are looking at the crime rates going up. Not just the homeless.
- Rising costs
- Making sure our city policies are monitored to ensure we can still provide affordable housing
- Whenever they come up with a lot and they build a complex 'this is going to be for the low income this is affordable housing'. The next thing you know they are moving in desks and beds and dressers and it's for the students. Everything around here is geared towards the students (not low income). Affordable housing is not affordable to the people that actually live here. Because everytime they built something it's not for the city it's for the college students. Their prices are high. And then they want us to move in there after the students are gone for the summer. But we can't afford to do that. Their rent is way over the top because they have parents paying for it. And we as Columbia's, working parents, maybe

students can't afford that. The housing needs to be better and not on the outskirts. We need to be able to live in towne where we can get transportation and catch the bus without having to be outside the city somewhere and still be able to afford it.

- I see a big picture issue of an increase in population living below poverty
- Lack of adequate transportation
- Policy decisions made by the city can exacerbate a situation
- Lack of strategic planning and effective and timely investment in needed capital improvement (infrastructure). I think we see that all around the city. I mean it basically in every single sector you can think of.
- Aging infrastructure of our city needs to be addressed
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- Aging infrastructure of our city needs to be addressed
- Ensure all have financial economic mobility. If you are born into poverty in Boone County the chances of getting out of it are very low. One of the lowest in the United States
- When developers come here, they have to go before the city. Part of the presentation is they have to say how much of what they are doing is affordable. Usually they meet the minimum percentage. But as you said, who is getting those spaces. We do not pay enough attention to whenever people are coming here and are getting the tax breaks and we are not requiring anything but the minimum and we have no idea who is living in those spaces.
- The projects on Unity and Lincoln were remodeled. They moved all the people out and told them when it was done, they would move back in. No, because the rent is a whole lot higher and who is in them, college students. It's close to campus, it's on the route and those particular ones you know people grew up there and have been there since the building and they moved them out. First they moved them down the hill to LaSalle and Trinity, if they had space or they moved them to 3rd and 4th street. And they told them, you can move back once it's remodeled but another company bought it and it's call Stewart and the other one is called Parker. Which is still part of the city but you didn't allow those people to move back in. So they are in something that is much less with some slumlord who don't care when they had some place to live.
- I've lived in a couple college towns and that is a side effect of a college community. The colleges are large and they engulf the residents. The residents

and the city itself need to have some pushback otherwise they will just engulf you.

- I was living here before urban renewal. And the gentrification continues and that is all that it is. They devalue your property if you live in the hood so they can take it from you for little to nothing. Then they come in, they develop it, then they rent it to whoever the highest bidder might be. Gentrification, plain and simple. It's been going on since the 1950's.
- We have great opportunities for healthcare in this community but I think the poor and minorities education about the healthcare opportunities, what is available to them, understanding what their physician might be telling you. I wish there was a way, I know the county might be working on some of that stuff but I don't think I think there is a big difference between minorities and non-minorities and poor and understanding what is available, their rights, and just how to navigate that system. I am not sure how to fix that. I just wish that people of color and people of lower socio-economic incomes backgrounds had opportunities. Maybe a liaison? That is my goal for 2019 for my business is getting information out there. Most people don't understand things like advanced directives. How we educate people about the resources available to them.
- I would like to see full employment in the black community. Without jobs there will be more violence. When I ride by a construction site, I am going to see things differently than you. If I don't see a black guy working there, I am mad. You probably are. I got a radio program and we used to talk about a place for kids to go to recreate. What came out of that was the ARC. I go to the ARC now, I don't see any black kids working in there. I was there with my wife one day and I left there in tears. Every lifeguard was white. We need to get jobs for our young people. Somebody is sitting on the wheel, somebody is not letting it happen. Phil who runs the Housing Authority slipped up and let that happen on Unity and Lincoln. Somebody is not doing what they are supposed to do.We as black people hope there isn't some meeting of 8 white men going on saying let's not let black people have anything. I don't think there is a meeting, I hope there is not.
- Racism is not that overt. The racism that is prevalent here in Columbia in city government and the way they do things in the city of Columbia is overwhelming, its stifling, and it's been that way for a very long time. Again, the Civil Rights Act was put in place in 1964. Not one year has the city complied or met the minimum requirements of the Civil Rights act. They don't care. They really don't. And until you can affect their money, until you can stick your hand in their pocket and slow them down with the controls that are in place they have carte blanche to do whatever they want
- Racism

- How do we get our youth to take ownership? We have got to make our kids take ownership we can't just say we are a victim. They have to go look for a job. You have to take care of the things you have and other people's things when you have the opportunity. No, things are not fair but we must take some ownership with this with our youth.
- That's why it's important for minorities to play a role in providing services for themselves. We can't always expect someone else to do what's important to you. If you know it's an issue in the black community and you know that's a problem there then that is what requires black leadership to step up and play a role for those that are disadvantaged in our community.
- I would like to see more people of color in city leadership positions across the board. Whether it's on task forces, commissions, paid positions, city staff. What we have now is not representational of our city.
- Homelessness. High number among teens and youth. They are couch hopping. *This follows them into being young 20 yr olds.* If they do get housing, they may not have a job and get evicted. Vicious cycle.
- Volunteers used to teach kids how to teach them how it happened, how it goes, how to want a position in a city office. They aren't doing that anymore. You can't expect someone do something if you don't know how. You can't utilize something you never had, or never been taught it. They don't have any volunteer programs at city hall for us, to teach them how it goes to make them want a position. Junior Achievement program you took it from us. We don't have that anymore. You can't expect the youth to want something they don't know anything about.
- Opportunities and education to move up Especially for a minority

- CARE program give you an opportunity to shadow, good program. Doesn't reach everyone. I would like to see a youth entrepreneurial program.
- There are things happening that we don't share in the community. The CARE program is underutilized. It's a half million dollar budget. It is important to help teens gain much needed social capital. The city *managers office* hired Stacey Smith to be liaison between the city and the neighborhoods. I want to make sure the city shares this information widely as many don't know about it. We need a strategic communication plan at the city to make sure everybody knows about what's going on and what opportunities are there.
- You can create a position (for the CARE program) and they will send a youth to be involved
- The social capital is what we all have to work on
- I was also in that position. *(Stacey Smith's)*. I lost my position when my mom got sick, got fired for being *13 minutes* late to a meeting. I was at my mother's bedside. Those things have to stop.
- City is going to face reduced revenues, which is going to be a huge issue. We (Columbia) is trying to do everything but we don't have the same revenue we used to have. Columbia needs to look for other revenue sources.
- The city has grown exponentially in a very short time. A lack of planning and evolution is how we do business is evident, now we are in a cycle of trying to catch up. I see so many areas in the city where I ask "how did this happen? Why did they do this?". If there was effective planning and implementation this would be a problem.
- Reduced city revenues. Impacts infrastructure, trash, etc.

Now I don't because the community development block grant funds, they would pinch off the money to the organizations who ask for funding but then give a big amount of money to build the street in front of Columbia College because it 'benefits the community'. - Bring back affirmative action. Require a quota of minorities. When you don't do it, they don't do it.
- Better strategic planning, specifically in bringing employers here. We have a lot of people who are underemployed.
- For the city to be behind small business development
- Efficient management to provide positive change
- Learn how to increase review. Maybe partner with MU for this?
- Safety. We have got to make this a community where people feel safe.
- Build and maintain our infrastructure. If our infrastructure is deteriorating and not keeping up our community won't grow.
- While you are building, put some black people on the crew.
- The city must do a better job of providing incentives for companies to come here and pay a living wage. We can't rely on the university for everything.
- Incentive current employers to pay hiring wages
- American Outdoor Brand and Aurora Dairy received bonds that require they pay a living wage and must reflect the faces our our community. They are hiring and must reflect our faces or they lose their tax incentives.
- Unemployment rate for African Americans is high, don't have living wage jobs. How can we get companies to look at workforce, race of its workforce, and try to be more diverse. We need the city to help connect the dots between businesses who are hiring and those seeking a living wage job.
- If the city would lead the way and comply with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 then employers around the area would catch on and would take that leadership and further develop it. That's how you eliminate this quagmire we are in now. As long as nothing is done, nothing will change.
- Why is the City losing money? The city is growing, businesses are coming in. Is there a simple answer to why?

- Our revenue structure is built upon sales tax. Since sales tax is decreasing. We have built a company called the City of Columbia on a revenue source that is not reliable. We have got to look for different ways to figure it out.
- They waste more money than they utilize. When you have four city water and light trucks at a location where only one is needed, that is waste, fraud and abuse of tax dollars. They have some of the worst management of any company that I have ever seen. But it's okay for the good old boy thing to work that way.
- Lack of preventive measures. Re-entry. People coming back here out of jail. There are no services to support them. Then when crime increases a lot of those crimes are being committed by those who basically have no options and are desperate. When there are no measures in place to prevent those types of things from happening, they most likely will happen.
- We need to replace the city manager form of government. There are other cities of similar size that do not have the city manager model of government. It was put in place by a gentleman who was king of the mountain. We need to get rid of the Ray Beck model. It's not conducive to growth in the city of Columbia. Replace the city manager form of government.
