Hello City of Columbia,

I am writing regarding the importance of installing physical barriers to prevent more deaths at the Fifth and Walnut Parking Garage. Physical barriers save lives; signs are not enough. Physical barriers are critical. I attended the University of Missouri for undergrad and graduate school and am now a provisionally licensed psychologist and nationally certified school psychologist working in our Columbia schools; I have received critical training on suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention and would like to take a moment to share some of the information that I have learned in my years of training.

As a mental health professional in our community, one death by suicide is too many and, unfortunately, with this parking structure being the tallest in our city, it has become known as a local hotspot for suicide completion and **a physical barrier is needed to save lives.**

Research on suicide prevention and intervention indicates that placement of suicide prevention signs or even call boxes have not been shown to affect suicide rates in locations that are highly lethal means of suicide completion. However, research indicates that physical barriers **do** reduce suicide rates in areas that are common and lethal. Please see this article for additional information on research regarding physical barriers.

It is important to understand that individuals who are contemplating suicide are in a state of emotional crisis and are known to act impulsively. Many people incorrectly assume that an individual who wants to die by suicide will just go on to find another way if one lethal method is restricted, although this is not supported by research. Suicidology research shows indicates that nine out of ten individuals who are survivors of suicide attempts do not go on to die by suicide later (see this article). Suicide occurs in a moment of crisis and restricting access to lethal means has been shown to reduce suicide rates. A physical barrier at this garage would serve as a reduction of access to lethal means for our entire community.

Other locations around the world have put up physical barrier deterrents as it has become understood that they do indeed work; the Golden Gate Bridge suicide deterrent that will be completed next year as an example. An advocate for the Golden Gate Bridge suicide deterrent was

a survivor of a suicide attempt and indicated that he regretted the decision as soon as he took the action. Sometimes even just a matter of minutes of passing through the crisis can be enough for an individual to begin thinking more clearly and rationally as the emotional pain abates. Physical barriers and deterrents save lives; signs and call boxes are not enough.

I know, that in these times, the city's budget is tight; however, I do hope that you consider the stakes of this decision. The stakes at hand are the lives of our fellow Columbians and mid-Missourians; if you were to choose the less costly and ineffective methods, you would be sending the message that our city does not value mental health. We know that physical barriers can help deter suicide attempts and save lives, and therefore it needs to be done at this garage. There are families in our community who are grieving the death of loved ones who completed suicide at this very parking garage and it is highly likely that additional attempts and suicide completions will continue at this very location, otherwise, you all would not be having this open platform and consideration as you consider the community's options in addressing this problem.

I sincerely thank you for your time and am hoping to hear good news next steps regarding this critical decision for the City of Columbia.

Good Evening

I am writing to you to comment on the need for physical barriers at Fifth and Walnut.

I could write something super brief about this, but I don't want it to get skimmed over. This subject is incredibly important to me, and sadly way closer to me than I'd ever like to talk about.

- This school year my daughter became really close friends with a girl named Clara Clara had lost her father from that very spot less mere months prior. Clara is a loveable, sweet, and at times super sad child. No child should ever have to mentally process their father being lost that way. She and her mother are SO incredibly brave and kind. Mental health is a LONG overdue we should all be working hard to normalize in conversation. A sign wouldn't have stopped her father. How do I know? Because it never stopped my mother.
- From the time I was around Clara's age I remember something being very off balance with my mom. Later in life I learned her family had begged she pray her mental health struggles away instead of medicating. As you can imagine this didn't actually work, so for now over thirty years I've watched my mom ride the mental health roller coaster FAR too many are familiar with....ok one day....feeling ok so stopping medication....attempting to harm herself. My story ended in severe abuse and me growing up with my dad, but several years later I asked her what she was thinking when she attempted to harm herself. Her answer..."a means". Said she saw and heard nothing. She just locked into the idea and put the gears in motion. Several times this in fact saved her. She had a fender bender not paying attention once, fell down her living room half stairs once, and even once got lost. I've done a lot of research into the manic/schizophrenic/depressed brain and it often gets described by terms like "going numb" and "seeing red". Nothing I've ever read came anywhere close to the ability to notice much less adhere to a sign in the vicinity. Each time she tried to harm herself some form of physical barrier or person got in her way. I'm sure one day that will not be the case.
- A year ago last week one of my childhood friends reached out to let me know that his brother Chris, whom I also grew up with, had died by suicide at the Golden Gate Bridge. Chris battled a very tragic alcohol addiction, so they couldn't say for certain if he fell or jumped. What would have stopped him either way, even if just for a second, a physical barrier. One more chance to see his family even. There's a sign in that spot. I know because I learned of it in Mark Lukach's book "My Lovely Wife in the Psych Ward." The author is incredibly frustrated that nothing has been done to better barrier this spot, thus many deaths by suicides have occured.
- A month ago today one of my dear friends, incredibly stressed after recently completing her PhD and her new job in DC became in danger, walked off a parking garage to her tragic early death. Lindsey, like many others, was overwhelmed with mounting stress. She potentially would have recovered from these times had something stopped her. That's a hard pill.
- Three years ago I was project managing a condo building construction in Chicago. My General Contractor was a woman, which I found incredibly impressive, and she was fierce! The project got wrapped up in permitting tape and she started to feel a lot of heat from my subcontractors. At 4am in the morning on a friday she walked

directly up to the plastic fencing we had up for osha regulations, easily pulled it down, and jumped to her death on the sidewalk facing Division Street.

Do I think physical barriers will end death by suicide or fix all of our mental health problems? No. But if it saved even ONE life, isn't that one life of more value than the cost of installing them? It HAS to be.

As a former architect (now homeschooling parent and artist) and project manager I'd love to volunteer my time to collaborate with a planning team or help any way possible.

That garage roof is a really difficult place for many to pass. It would mean the world to me if Clara could see the compassion and action I know this city is capable of.

I will never forget the trauma that two young children who were in the post office parking lot were experiencing as they witnessed the direct aftermath of my classmate's act, not to mention the terrible pain and suffering that my classmate's family and friend experienced as well. This is not to blame the city for anyone's actions. However, I do believe it is incumbent upon the city to implement some sort of deterrant for those thinking of jumping from the garage.

In my 8 years in Columbia, I have witnessed at least 2 individuals die by suicide by jumping off this parking garage. I have not just learned of it through news, media, or conversations but have actually witnessed this occur, twice. Reflecting on both instants, I thought, there is a simple solution to prevent this and despite my skills and training, I can't be the one to implement this change, but I can advocate for it. Thus, the purpose for this email.

As a psychologist, one of the critical research findings we know of regarding death by suicide is that it can be prevented. More so, the use of physical barriers are effective and critical in saving lives. This is monumental. Psychologist and mental health professionals have plenty of work and tools to effect change regarding mental health needs. But our community, lay persons, and general public can make an impact too. In this case, I am urging you to install physical barriers to do our community's part in saving lives. One death by suicide is too many. The cost of the death is not just one life but the community it impacts, the loved ones of the individual's well-being, and the potential for a contagion effect that is well founded in research.

I am writing in support putting preventative measures in place at the Fifth and Walnut parking structure to deter suicides. The seven suicides by jumping that have occurred from that garage is unacceptable. The impact of the suicides have effected many of the deceased's family, friends, neighbors, and the emergency responders that have been on scene.

The Memorial Bridge in Augusta, Maine had a safety fence placed in 1983. Prior to 1983, fourteen suicides by jumping occurred at that location. After the installation, no suicides by jumping occurred from the Memorial Bridge. Even more encouraging, the number of suicides by jumping did not increase at other locations. (Pelletier AJ. Inj Prev 2007; Feb; 13(1): 57–59.)

If these results could be applied to the citizens of Columbia, grief and suffering may be prevented. Preventing future suicides by jumping from the parking structure at Fifth and Walnut may allow suicidal individuals to seek help and treatment. During the economical struggle of COVID19, there have been many reports of increase in depression and suicidal ideation in many people. The installation of preventative measures to the parking structure is vital to help prevent future death in a time that is so uncertain. Thank you for your consideration.

In my five years of living in Columbia, I didn't have an opinion on the Fifth and Walnut parking garage. I didn't use it because it wasn't convenient to me, and I never heard of its glory as a suicide hot spot. Suicide is a complicated issue — it is a physical, emotional, existential and acute crisis. What a taller fence and a more complicated means to an end provides is time to reconsider — it buys more time to breathe. Because no matter how big of an issue death seems, access to it is a deciding factor to a person in crisis. As it stands right now, the Fifth and Walnut Parking Garage requires a simple jump to a guaranteed end.

Columbia lost the brightest light when James died. Please help ensure that the path for another bright light, staring down at the streets of the Columbia, is not so straight-forward.



There have been many deaths resulting from the incredibly accessible ledge of this garage - August 28, 2019 was my little brother's. Access is everything, and this is the most accessible location in our city from which one can jump or fall and be guaranteed to die. There are almost no preventative measures to keep people safe. A child could easily fall. This location has become romanticized as a suicide hotspot, not dissimilar to the Golden Gate Bridge. In addition to being used for self harm, high school and college students frequent the top level of this garage as a popular hangout and photo opportunity. Let me reiterate how easy it would be to accidentally or intentionally fall. A few measures that could easily be implemented include: completely closing off the top floor (the garage has plenty of parking availability without it), installing TALL and PROTECTIVE fencing and guard rails, and installing an emergency phone with numbers posted to crisis hotlines.

If we make these necessary changes, we may be able to ensure that my brother's death was the last from this garage.
