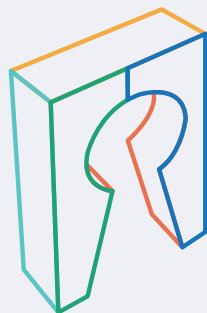

Introduction

The City of Columbia is committed to ensuring that community engagement is at the core of everything it does. With the belief that the best decisions are made when the community's voice is heard, the City has taken significant steps to create opportunities for residents to actively participate in shaping the direction of their city.

The first annual Community Summit, held March 15, 2025, served as an essential platform for the City to strengthen its relationship with the people it serves, foster meaningful dialogues and ensure the community's priorities are front and center in the City's decision-making processes.

Inspired by the award-winning #IamPSL Citizen Summit in Port St. Lucie, Florida, the event brought over 300 residents to City Hall. A key element of the summit was its focus on engaging residents in a way that went beyond the typical government meeting format. This event was intentionally designed to be an interactive experience, where residents could speak directly with City employees at all levels of government.

The summit featured over 30 interactive booths, offering residents the opportunity to engage with various City departments, provide feedback on services, strategic priority areas and potential future initiatives. This was facilitated through the use of poster boards that allowed residents to respond to specific questions with provided stickers. Summit attendees were also provided with a Summit Guide, a document in which they could record open-ended feedback on any of the questions. The Guide also included "CoMo Bucks," a kind of currency that residents could then choose to invest in any of the City's five strategic priority areas—Organizational Excellence, Safe Community, Inclusive & Equitable Community, Resilient Economy and Reliable & Sustainable Infrastructure. Options were also provided for children and teenagers to provide feedback.

Residents also had the opportunity to dialogue with City employees and learn more about City services, initiatives and City government overall. More than 100 City staff members from a wide range of City departments were present at each booth as subject matter experts, answering questions and providing additional context. Several employees, including department heads, functioned as "floaters" who walked the event, interacted with residents and ensured that they had no lingering questions.

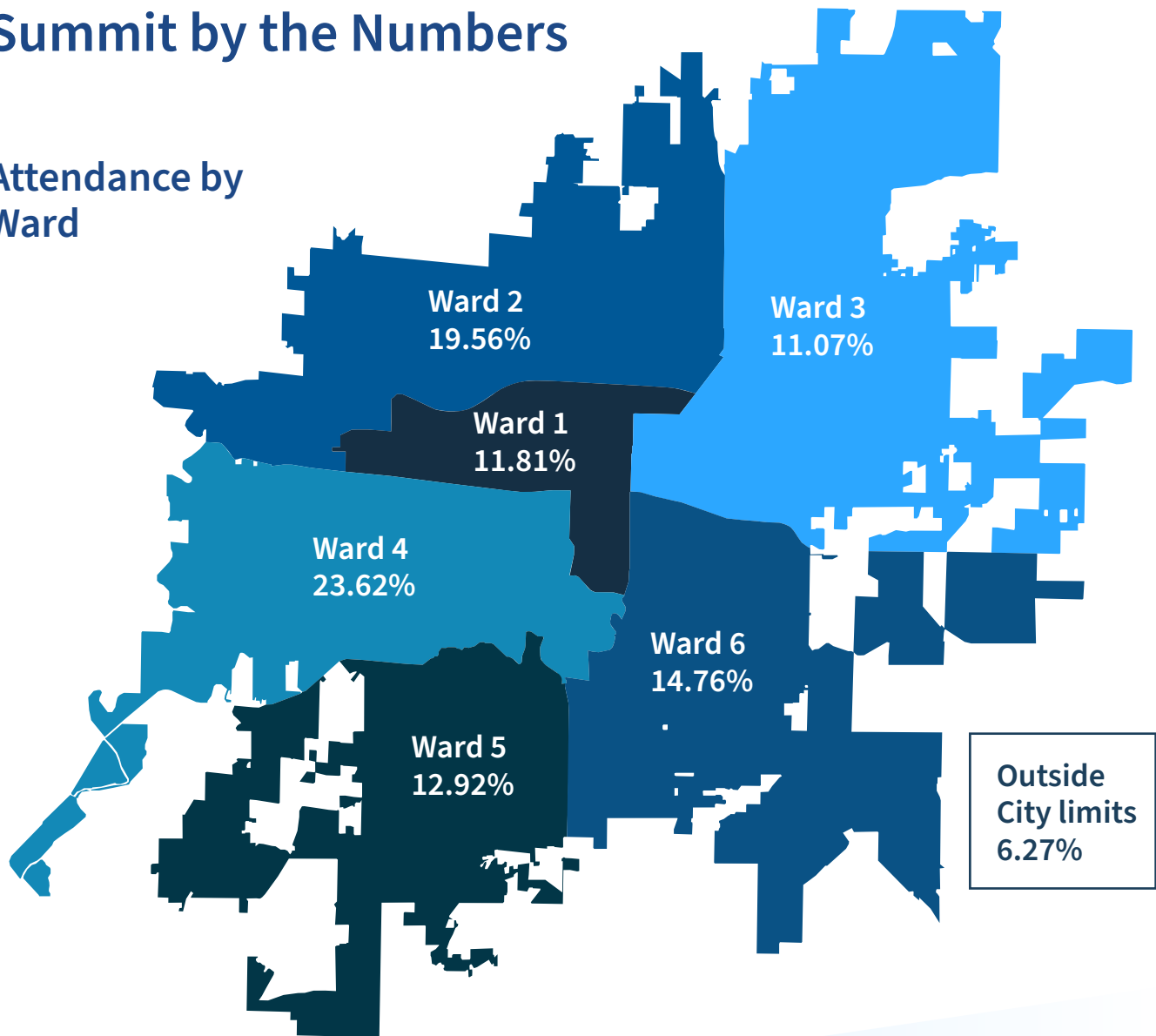

Community Survey and Engagement Opportunities

Over the past year, the City of Columbia has made resident engagement a top priority, expanding efforts to ensure community voices are heard and reflected in City decision-making. Through both in-person and digital platforms, the City has invested in initiatives that offer residents meaningful opportunities to share their perspectives, helping guide the City’s approach to growth, development and service delivery.

The Community Survey conducted last summer was one of the key initiatives that helped inform the Community Summit. In order to support efforts in data-driven decision-making, the City partnered with ETC Institute to conduct a citywide community survey in August and September 2024. The goal was to assess resident satisfaction with major City services and ensure alignment between resident needs and City priorities. This marked the first ETC-administered survey since December 2019–January 2020, just prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. The 2024 effort introduced a newly designed survey instrument, aimed at improving the quality and relevance of the data collected.

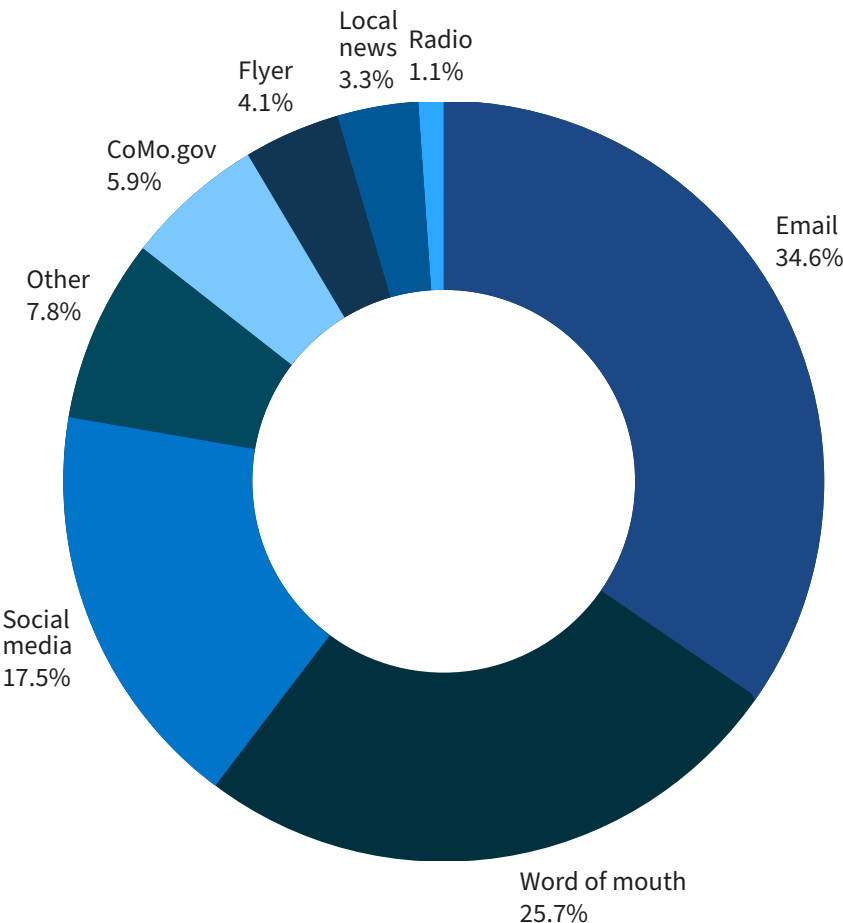
Other major initiatives include the forming of the Community Connectors program, conducting ward-specific monthly meetings and hosting educational town hall meetings for residents to learn about major City processes and services. Together, these efforts represent a renewed commitment to transparent, inclusive governance, and will continue to inform strategic planning and service improvements in the years ahead.

ORGANIZATIONAL EXCELLENCE

Goal Statement

Create and support an engaged workforce and organization that delivers an efficient, innovative, transparent and collaborative City government.



The Organizational Excellence priority area gave community members the opportunity to share their thoughts on a range of City functions, including job recruitment, digital tools and the budget process. One major area of feedback centered on the City's interactive mapping system, which participants recognized as a valuable resource. Many suggested additional features, such as updates on street and sidewalk repairs, upcoming closures and projects, crime statistics and utility upgrades. These insights will help the Information Technology department enhance the mapping platform's usefulness and relevance for residents.

Feedback also highlighted a strong desire for greater transparency and accessibility around the City's budget. Community members expressed interest in tools that make the budget process easier to understand, with short-form videos being the most preferred method, followed by community workshops and educational materials. This input will support efforts to improve communication as the City prepares for the FY 2026 budget and beyond.

In the area of workforce development, community members identified the City's website, Indeed.com and LinkedIn as the most commonly used platforms when searching for career opportunities. Additionally, health insurance was ranked as the most important job benefit, followed by retirement benefits and career advancement opportunities. These responses will help the Human Resources department refine recruitment strategies and ensure employment offerings align with what job seekers value most.

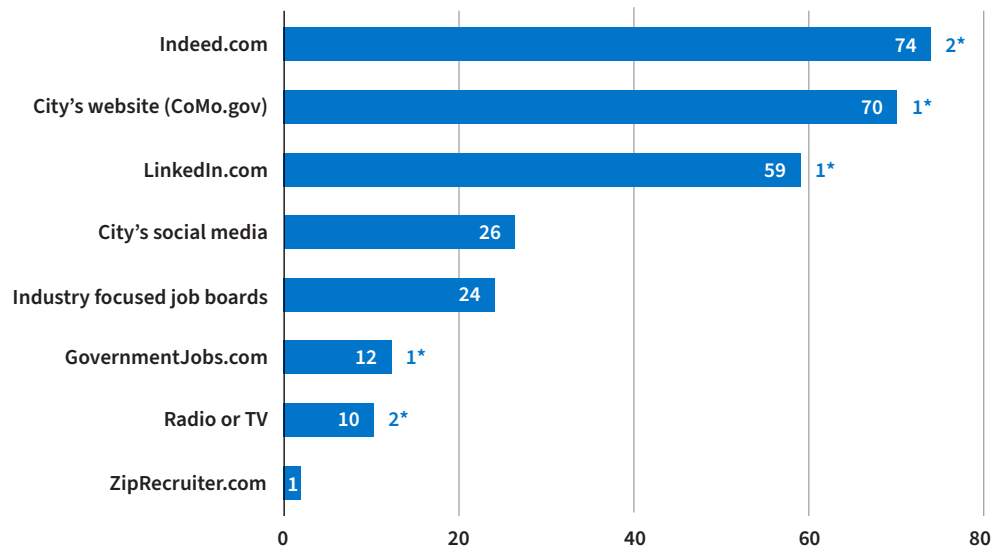

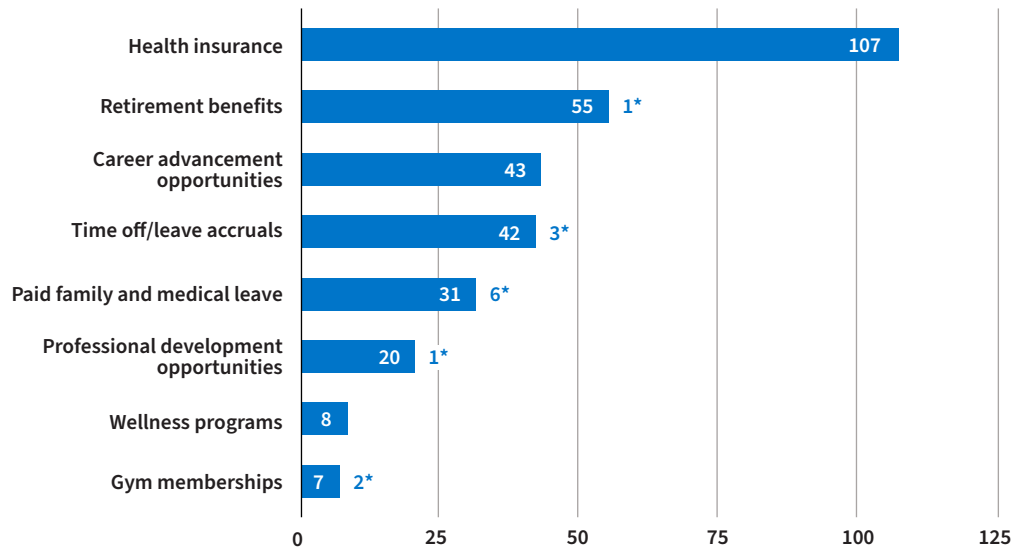

Residents were asked to select two options.

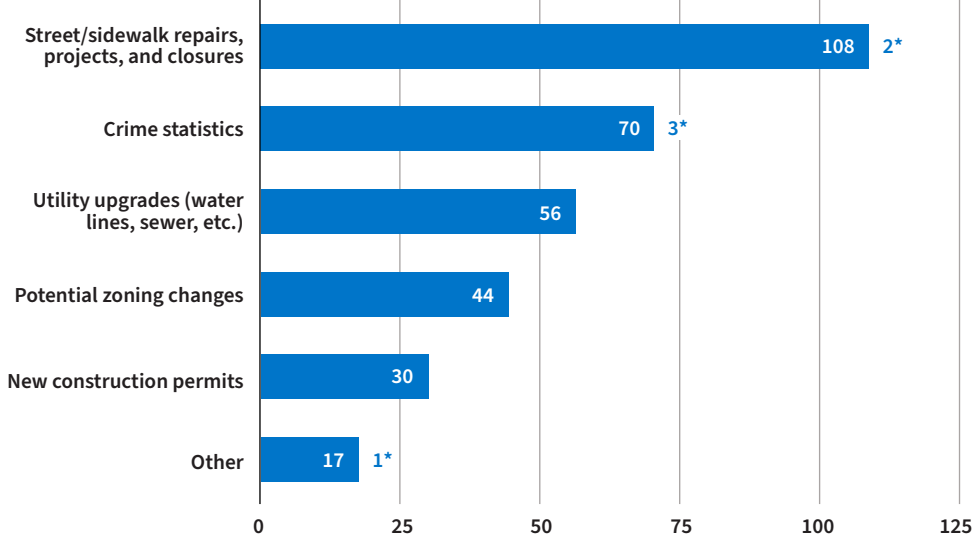
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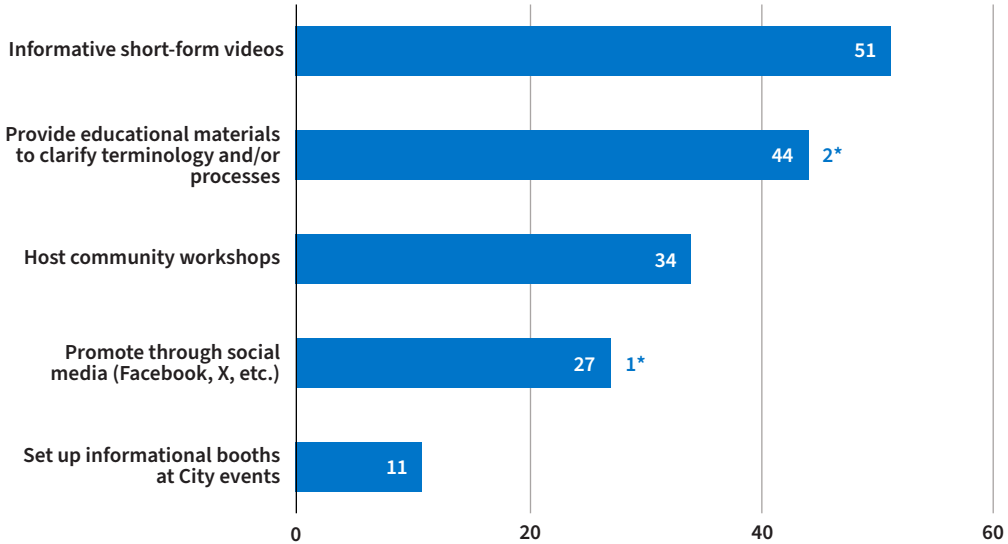
If the City created an interactive online map where you entered your address to learn about things happening in your immediate area, what types of information would you like to see on that map?

SAFE COMMUNITY

Goal Statement

Provide equitable community-centered public health and safety services to ensure the City is safe for all.



The Safe Community priority area gave residents the opportunity to share feedback on a range of public safety issues, including short-term rentals, fire prevention, homelessness, code enforcement and violence prevention. Their input will guide the work of multiple departments as they shape programs, policies and priorities to better serve Columbia.

For short-term rentals (STRs), nearly half of participants emphasized the importance of monitoring the number of STRs in neighborhoods, citing concerns about housing availability and neighborhood stability. Others pointed to guest behavior as a top issue, highlighting the need for clear expectations and enforcement. Staff also used the opportunity to share information about the City's STR ordinance and registration requirements.

The Fire Department gathered insights on fire safety preparedness in local homes. Most residents reported having working smoke detectors under 10 years old—a positive sign. However, many shared that their detectors were older or they were unsure of their age, pointing to a gap in maintenance awareness. A few reported having no detectors at all, underscoring the need for expanded outreach, education and installation efforts to ensure basic fire safety in every household.

When asked about the biggest code enforcement issues in their neighborhoods, many participants reported no concerns. While this is positive, there is also the potential that this does not represent citywide conditions. Among those who did cite concerns, the issues were varied and spanned multiple departments. The feedback also revealed a need to raise awareness of the “Report an Issue” tool on the City website and the MyCOMO app.

Community members also shared their views on homelessness and who holds responsibility for addressing it. A majority identified local government as the key leader, while others pointed to nonprofits, faith organizations and federal or state agencies. Many advocated for a collaborative, cross-sector approach, recognizing the complexity of homelessness and the need for shared solutions.

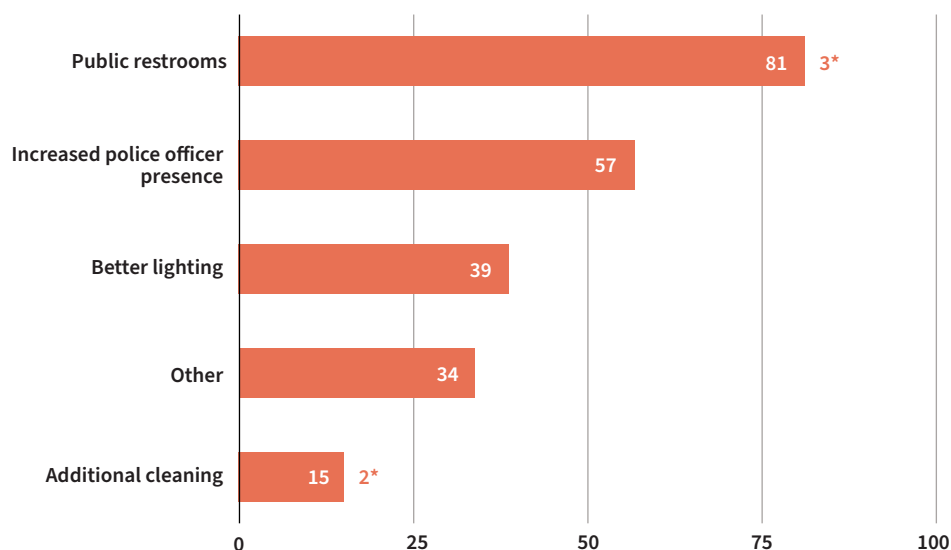
Finally, residents were invited to help shape the focus of the City's new Office of Violence Prevention. Youth programming emerged as the top priority, followed by support for community dialogue and funding opportunities for local groups. Additional suggestions included addressing domestic violence, expanding school-based supports and increasing support for social workers. This input will play a key role in guiding the Office's direction as it works to build a safer, more resilient community.

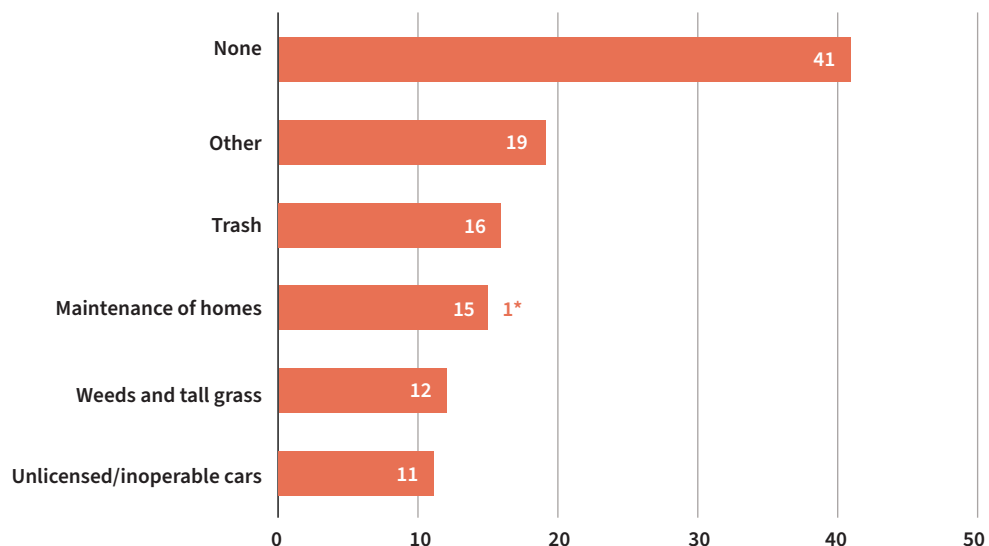

Residents were asked to select one option.

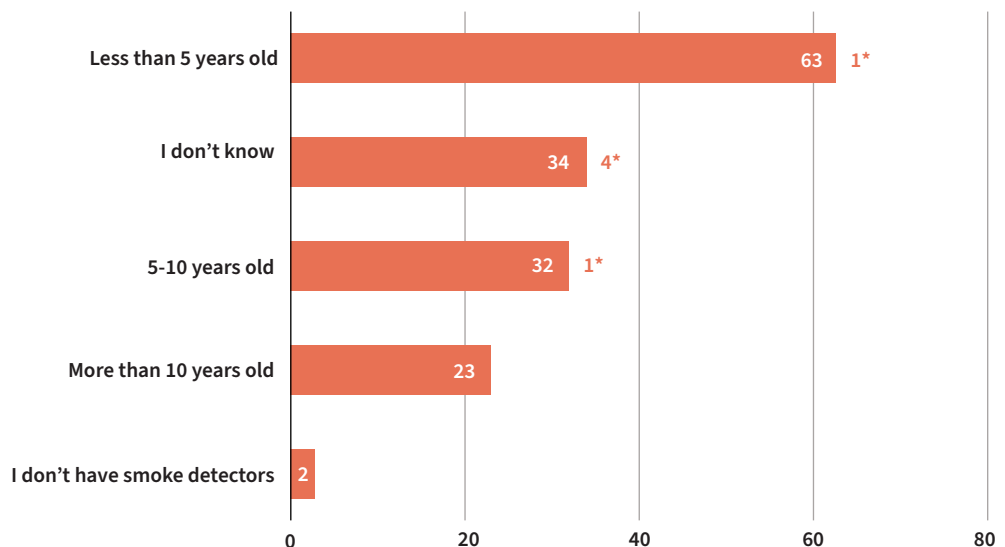

Residents were asked to select one option.

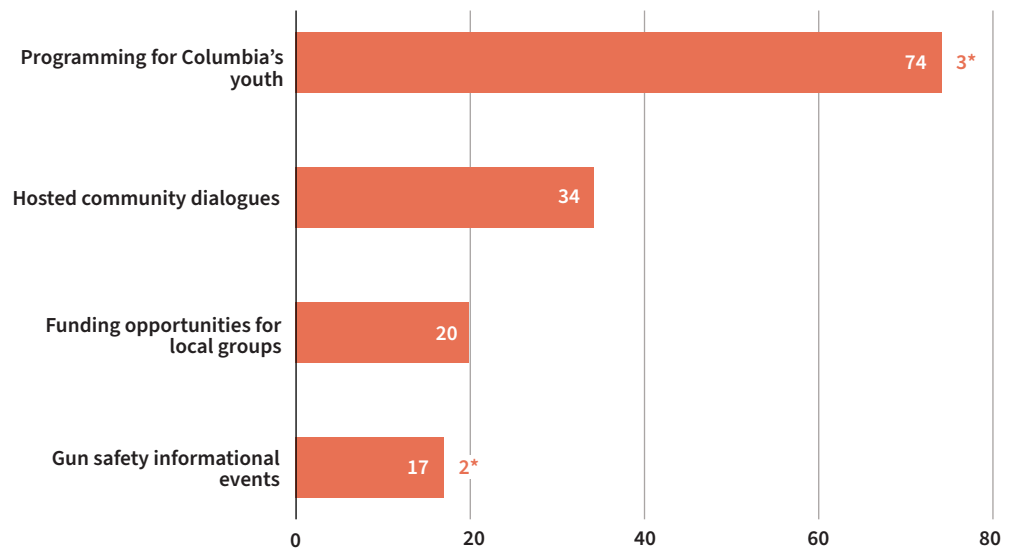

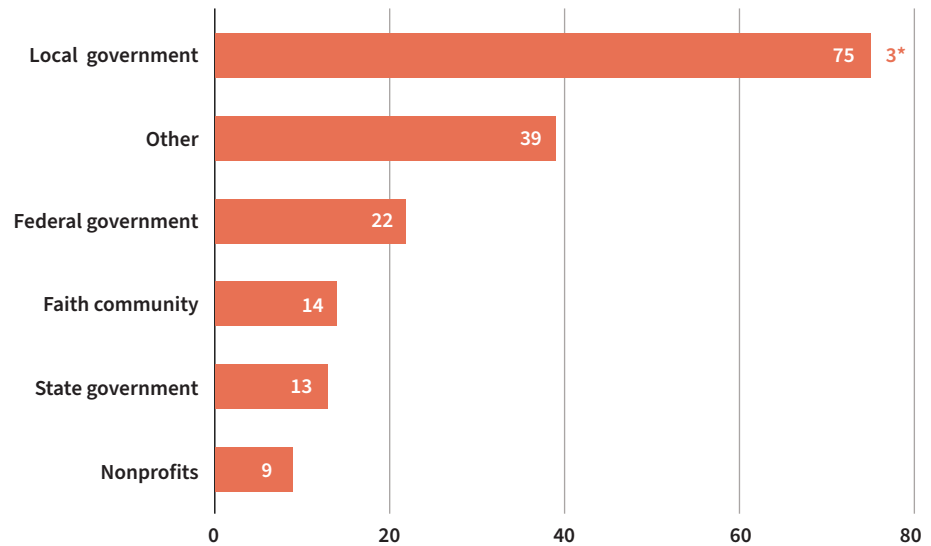

Residents were asked to select one option.

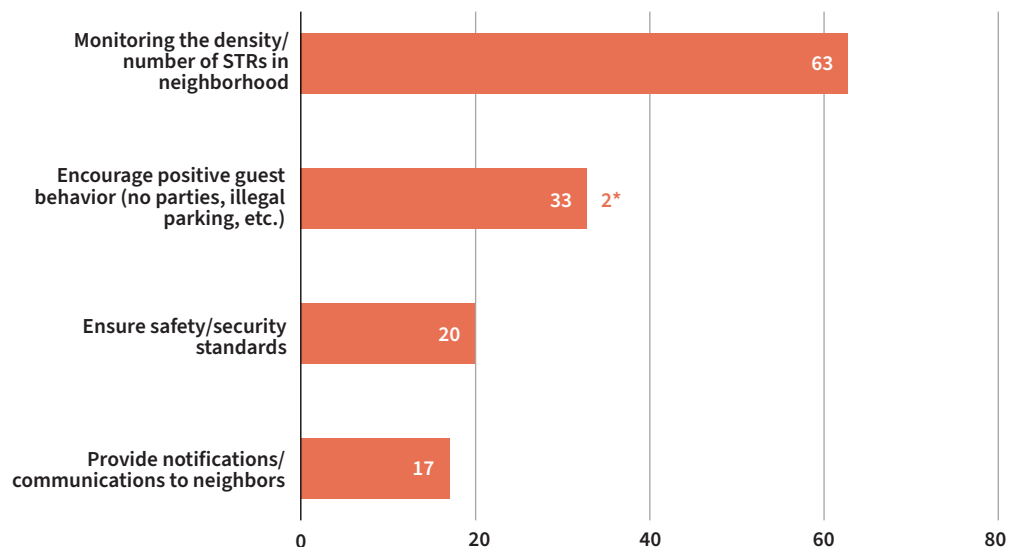

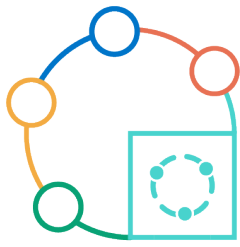


With the City beginning to license short-term rentals (STRs), such as properties used for AirBnB or VRBO, what can the City do to support neighborhoods?

INCLUSIVE & EQUITABLE COMMUNITY

Goal Statement

Cultivate a community focusing on equitable access, inclusive engagement and equal opportunity and treatment for all.

Community members who visited the Inclusive & Equitable Community priority area shared thoughtful feedback on how the City can better support the entire Columbia community. Input focused on three key areas: energy efficiency programs, public health and human services, and opportunities for community building.

When learning about the City's energy efficiency initiatives—such as the combined Home Performance Rebates and Loans program and Free Residential Energy Assessments—many participants expressed interest in participating but highlighted some potential barriers to access. Several shared that they were renters and either felt unsure whether they were eligible or did not know where to begin. Others simply were not aware these programs existed. This feedback highlights an opportunity for the City to expand outreach and consider new strategies for making environmental programs more accessible, especially for renters and residents in multifamily housing.

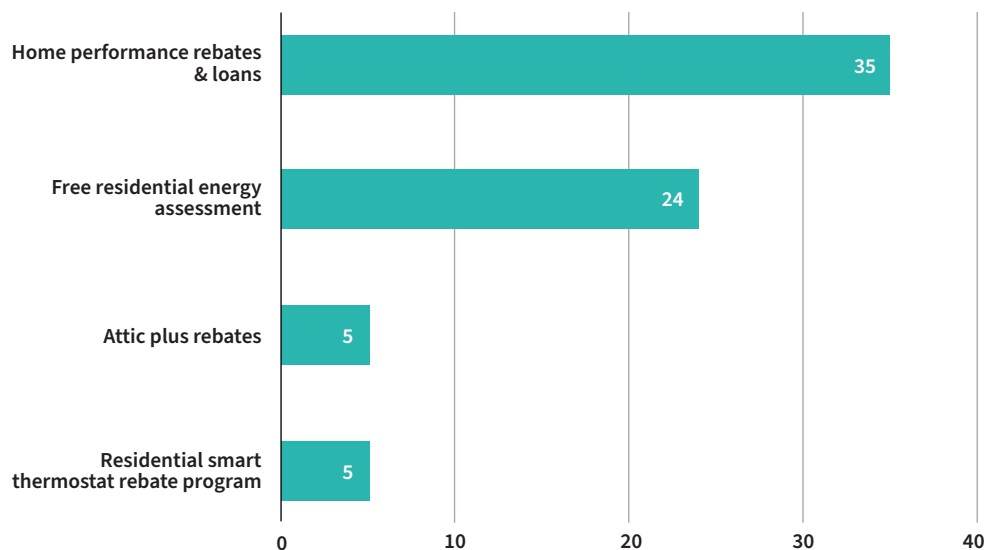
In relation to health and human services, community members prioritized mental health crisis prevention, homelessness reduction and support for affordable housing. These topics not only received the most support from available options, but also appeared frequently in open-ended comments—emphasizing the need for continued investment in housing stability and mental health access throughout Columbia.

Community-building opportunities also stood out. Many participants expressed a desire for more neighborhood events such as block parties and family-friendly gatherings. These types of activities were viewed as powerful tools for strengthening community ties and encouraging broader participation in local government. As the City designs future engagement efforts, this feedback underscores the value of informal, inclusive events that bring people together and foster a sense of belonging.



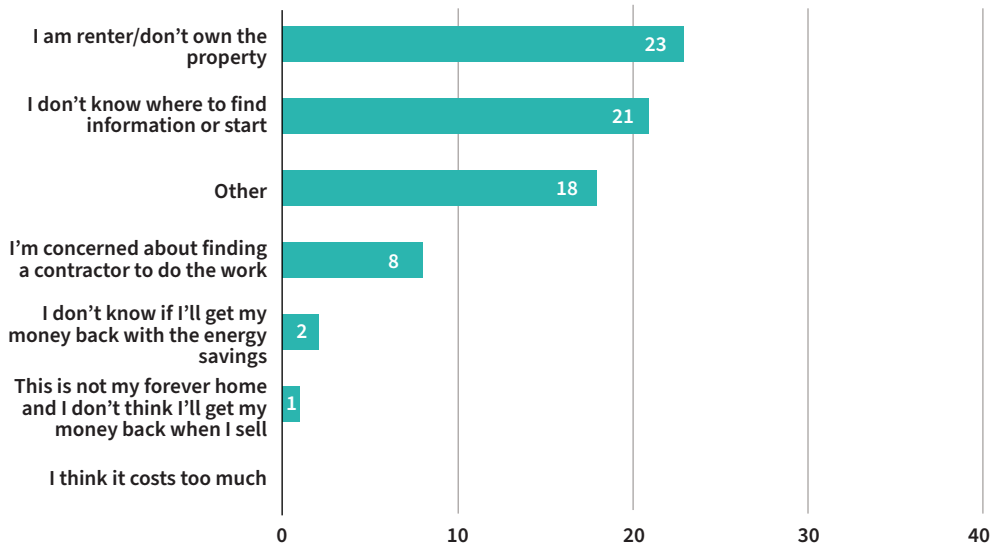
Have you ever participated in any of the City of Columbia Energy Efficiency Programs?

Have you ever participated in any of the City of Columbia Energy Efficiency Programs?

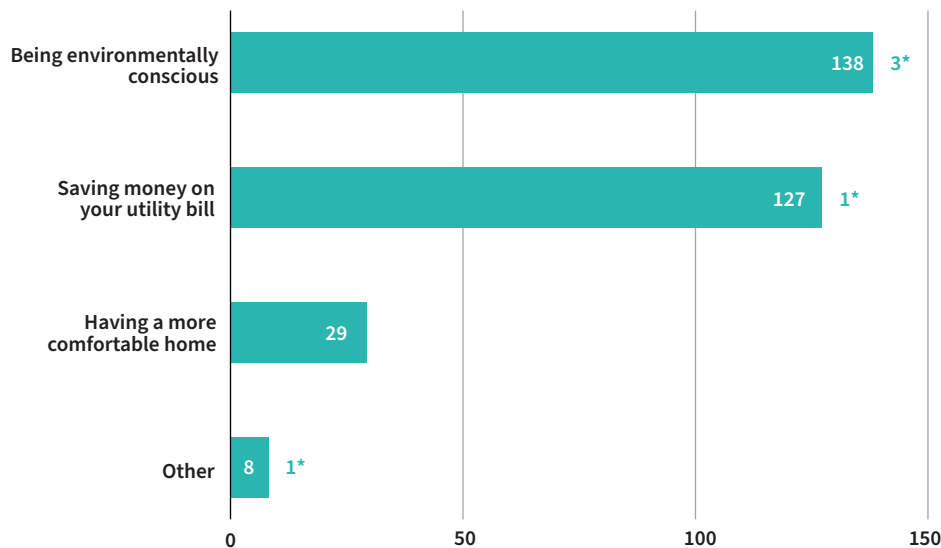

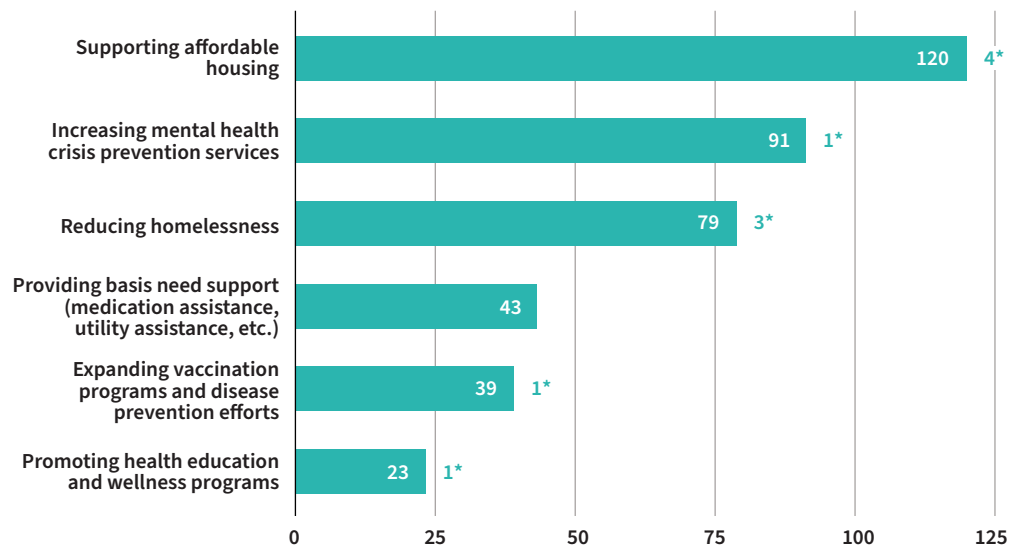




Which public health initiatives are most important to you?

Goal Statement

Foster a resilient and diverse economy that meets the needs of our community.

Community members who visited the Resilient Economy priority area offered valuable feedback on how the City can strengthen Columbia's economic future. Input was gathered across a variety of topics, including public art, airport services, transit improvements and funding, the relationship between housing and transportation planning, and economic development priorities.

There was strong support for increasing public art throughout the community. Participants identified parks, public spaces and roundabouts as top locations for future installations, with additional suggestions including roadways, medians, libraries and community centers—demonstrating a widespread desire to integrate art into everyday spaces.

Community members shared ways to improve Go COMO bus services to increase ridership. Residents called for more frequent and reliable routes, reduced wait times and expanded service hours. Suggestions also included clearer maps and schedules, as well as more bus shelters to enhance comfort and accessibility.

When asked how transit improvements should be funded, the most commonly supported option was a dedicated property tax, followed by a sales tax. While some respondents were open to introducing fares for the currently fare-free service, a smaller number expressed concerns about implementing any additional funding measures.

Participants also weighed in on how the City can better plan for attainable housing and transportation. The top recommendation was creating safe, continuous



and connected bike, pedestrian and transit networks. Additional priorities included locating essential services—such as grocery stores, health care and child care—closer to neighborhoods, increasing the diversity of housing types and encouraging development near employment hubs. Concerns about housing affordability and the influence of corporate landlords on rental availability were also commonly noted. Many community members advocated for walkable, mixed-use neighborhoods with small retail and grocery options to support daily needs.

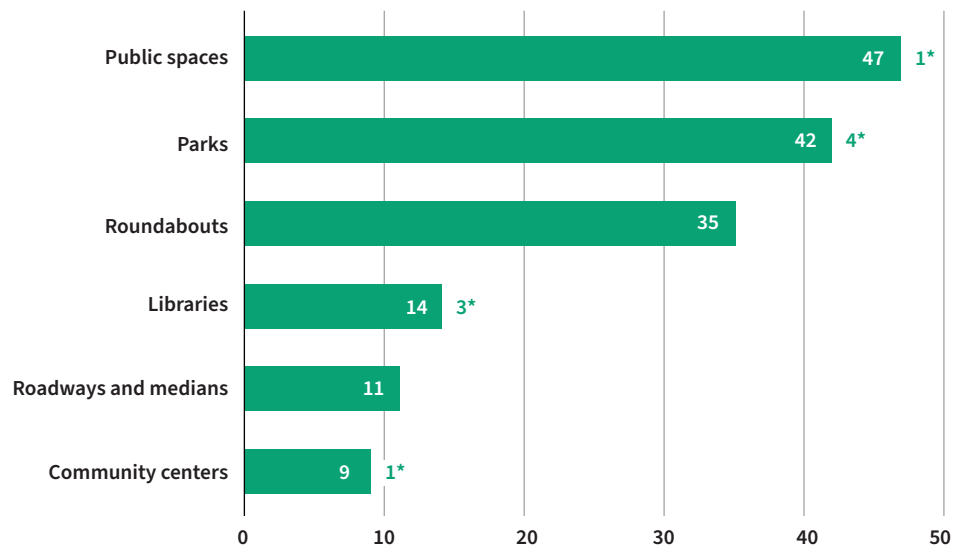
In terms of business development, residents expressed a strong desire for more locally owned businesses, especially in the areas of dining, retail, entertainment and fitness. Respondents highlighted a need for more family-friendly and age-inclusive entertainment venues, along with grocery options that emphasize health and variety—specifically calling out interest in stores like Trader Joe's or Sprouts.



Where would you like to experience public art?

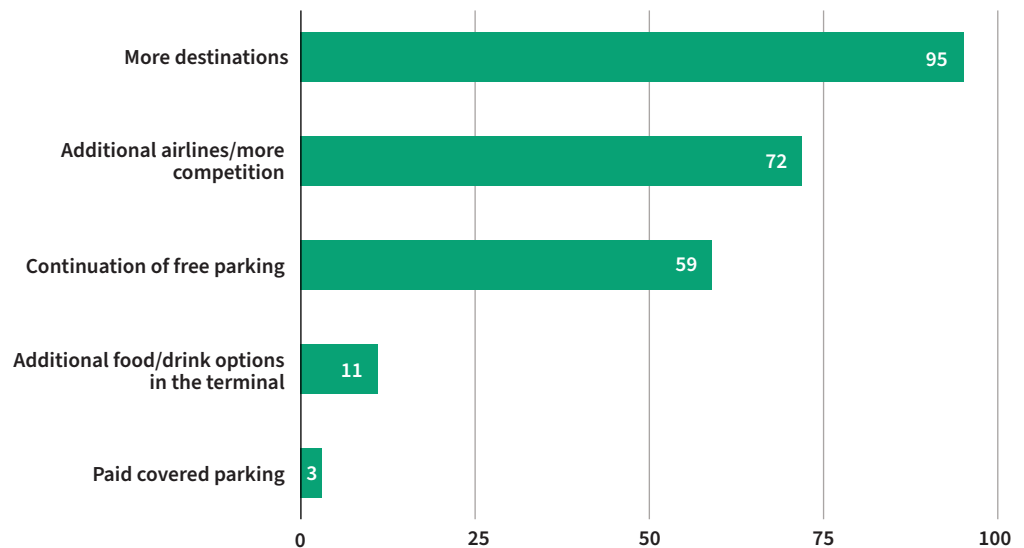

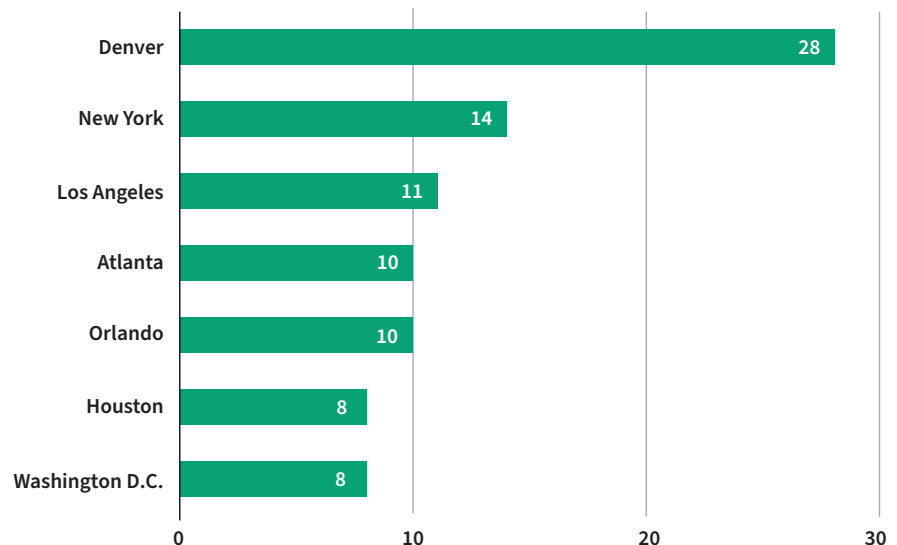
What types of amenities would make the Columbia Regional Airport (COU) a better choice for you?

What U.S. destination would you like to fly direct to from Columbia Regional Airport (COU)?

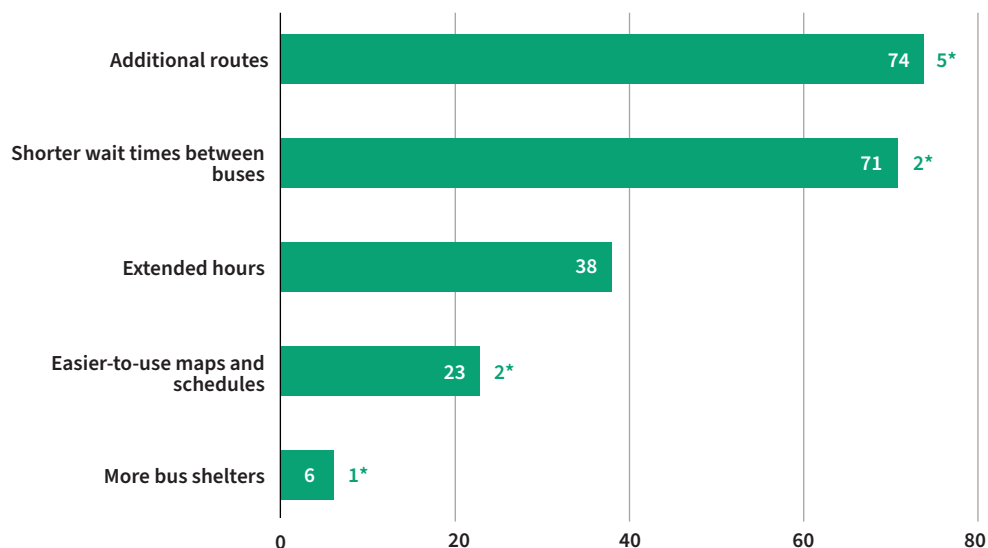

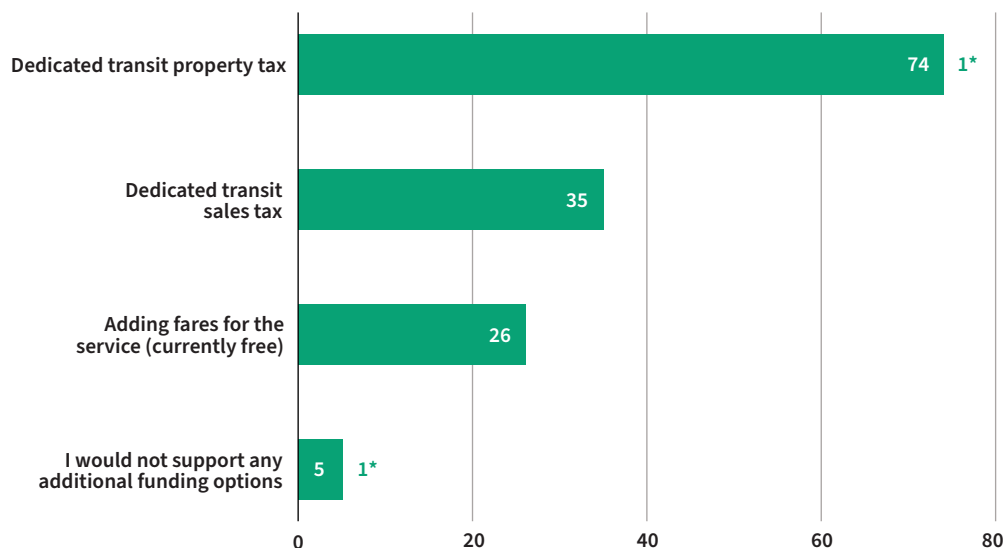

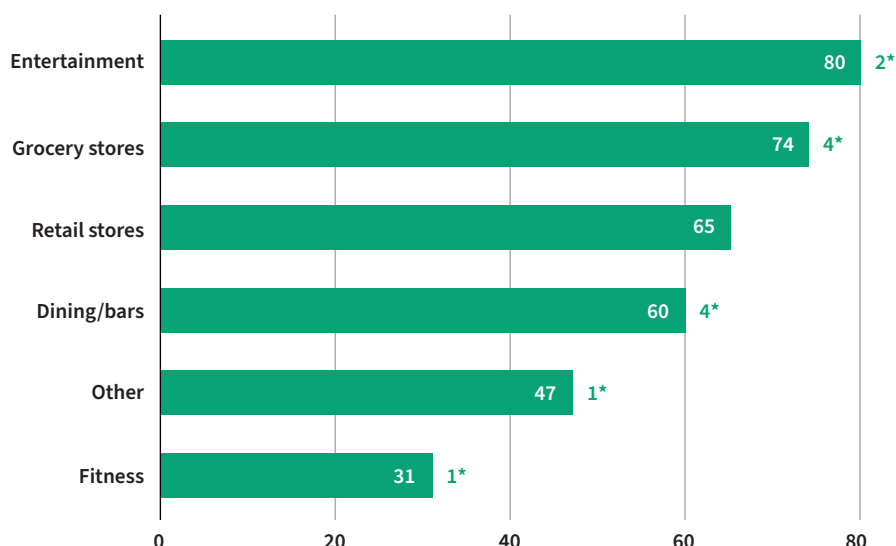

Residents were asked to select three options.

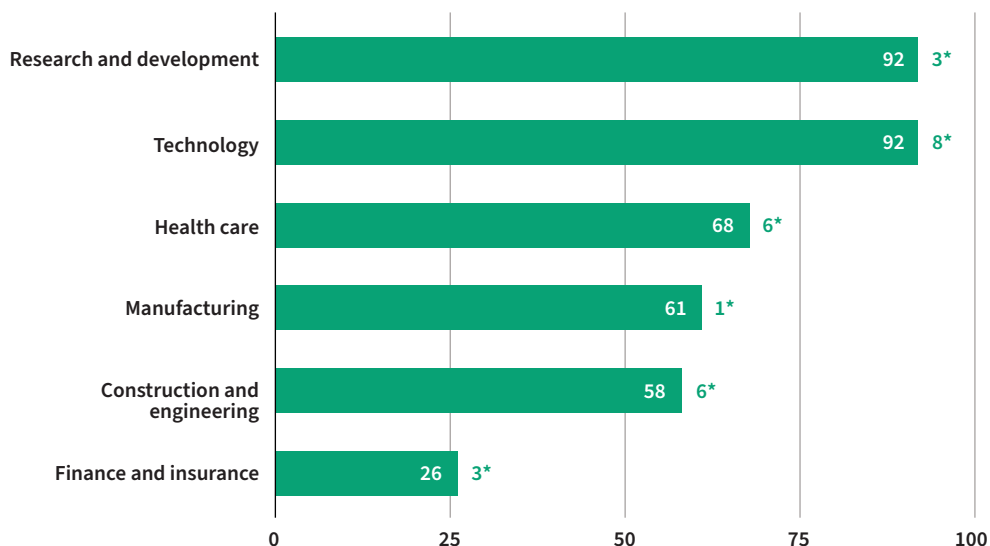

Residents were asked to select three options.

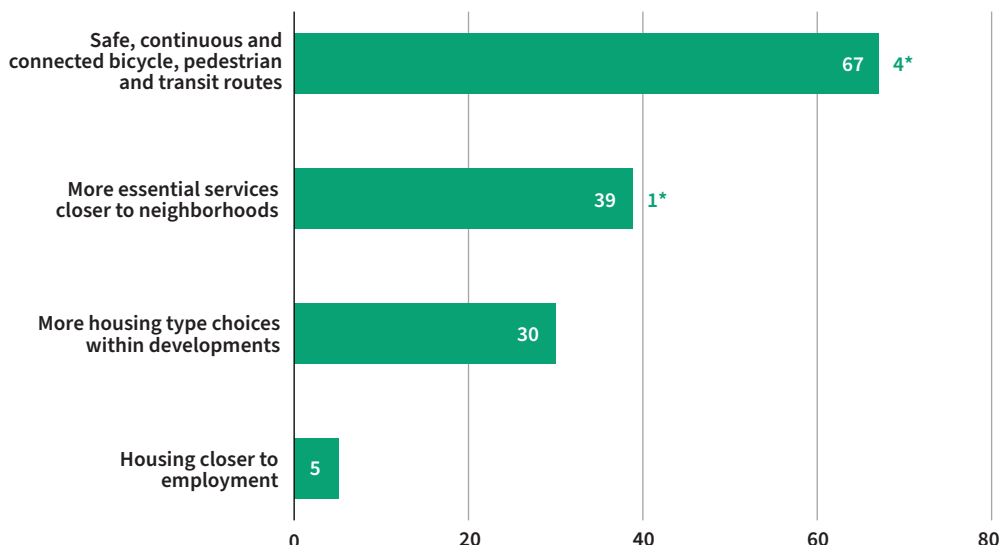

Goal Statement

Provide reliable, sustainable and innovative infrastructure for the efficient delivery of municipal services to meet the current and future needs of our community.



Community feedback gathered from the Reliable & Sustainable Infrastructure priority area reinforced the importance of resilient infrastructure and provided valuable insights for City staff across multiple service areas. Participants shared input on road quality, utilities, bike infrastructure, sidewalk connectivity and recycling programs—all of which play a critical role in Columbia’s long-term sustainability and livability.

Maintaining a high-quality road system emerged as a key priority, with residents emphasizing not only the importance of smooth and connected roadways, but also their role in supporting mobility and enhancing the city’s visual appeal. Participants also underscored the need for a more complete and connected sidewalk network, along with expanded trail systems that serve both recreational and practical transportation purposes. These insights will help guide future planning to improve accessibility and beautify Columbia’s public spaces.

There was strong support for expanding the City’s bike infrastructure. Community members expressed a clear

desire for more bike lanes—particularly those protected by permanent barriers from traffic—to improve safety and comfort for cyclists. This feedback will help shape transportation planning that supports biking as a viable and attractive mode of travel.

Participants also weighed in on City utility services, including water, electric, sewer, solid waste and stormwater. Residents emphasized the importance of delivering these essential services with a continued focus on reliability, affordability and energy efficiency. Their input will inform utility program development to ensure services evolve responsibly and sustainably.

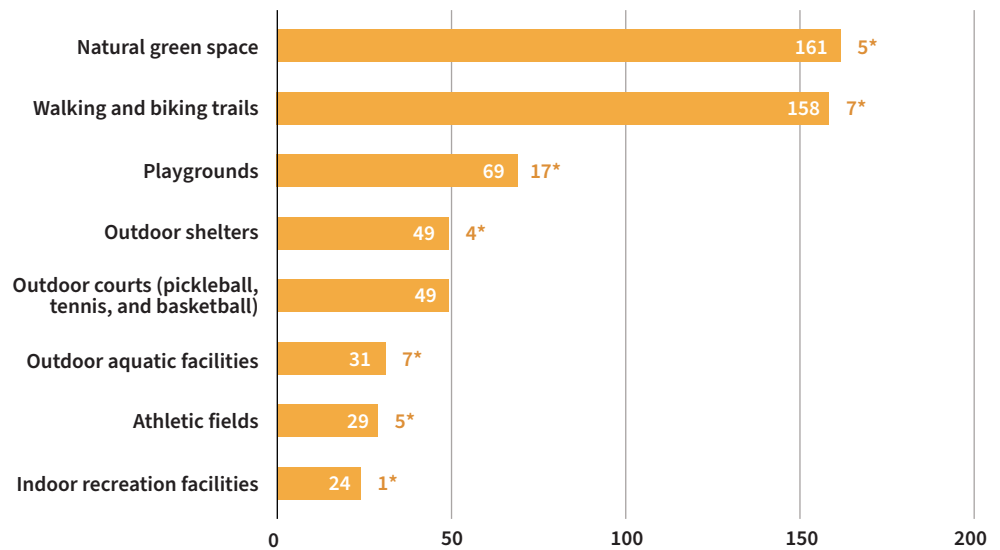
Recycling was another area of high interest. Residents called for the implementation of single-stream recycling, additional drop-off sites and more educational outreach to boost participation and awareness. These suggestions will help shape future recycling initiatives, making them more accessible, user-friendly and effective for the entire community.

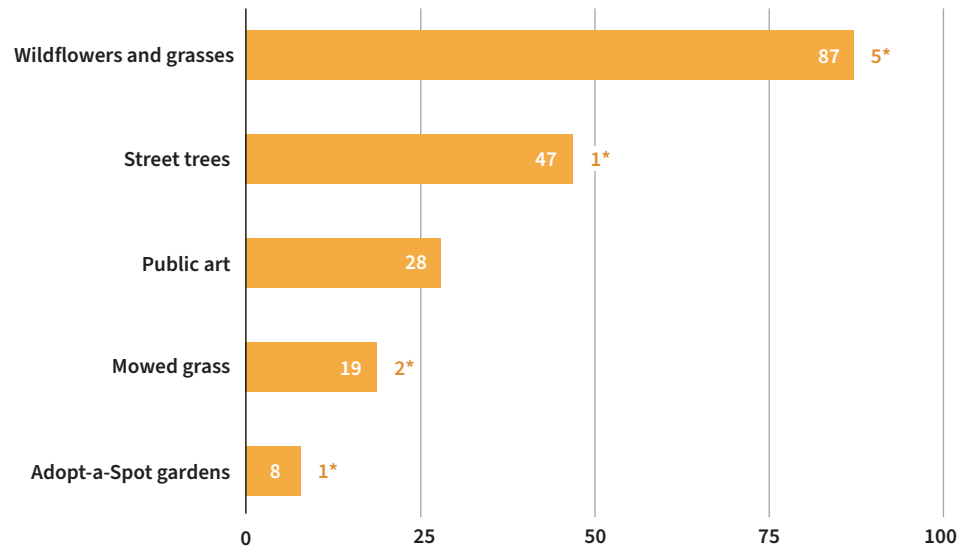

Residents were asked to select one option.

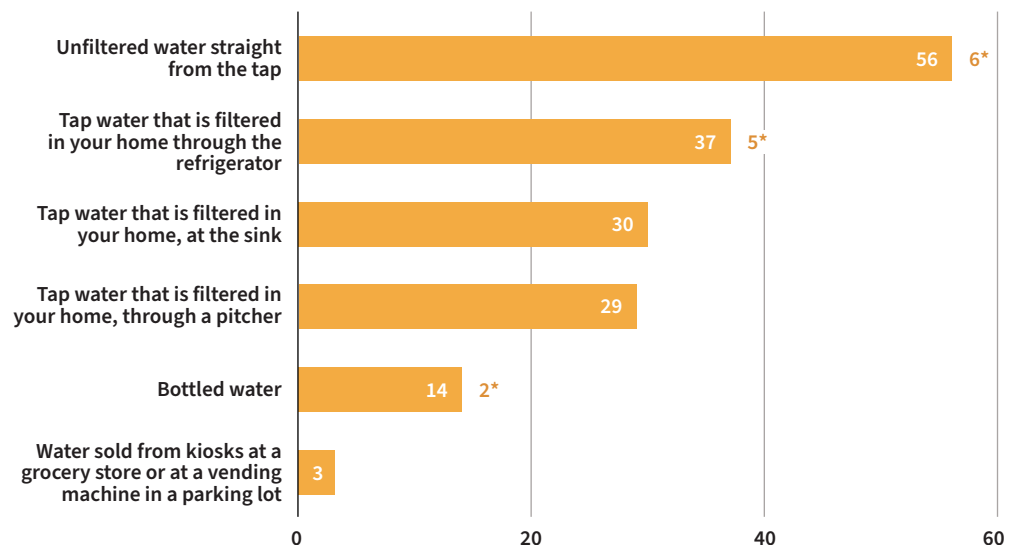

Residents were asked to select one option.

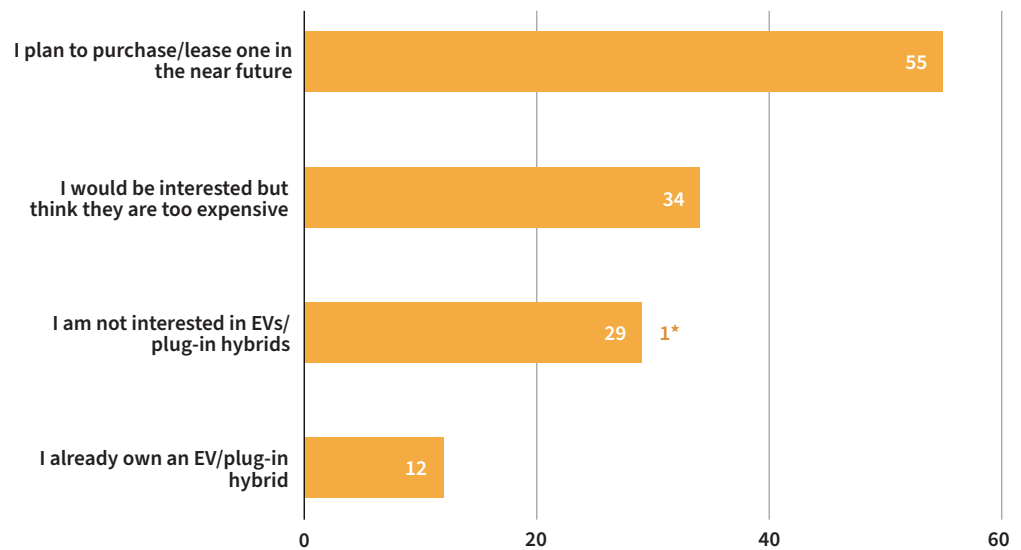

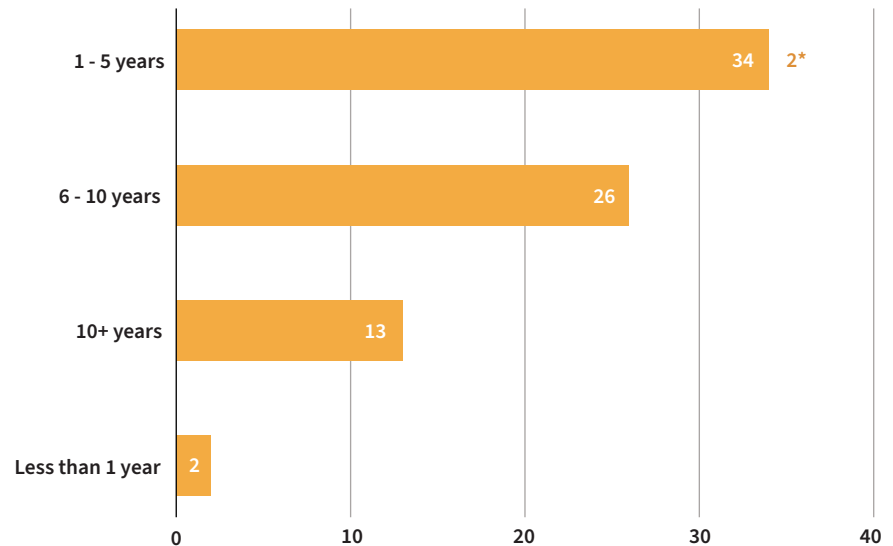
* Number of youth who voted within each option

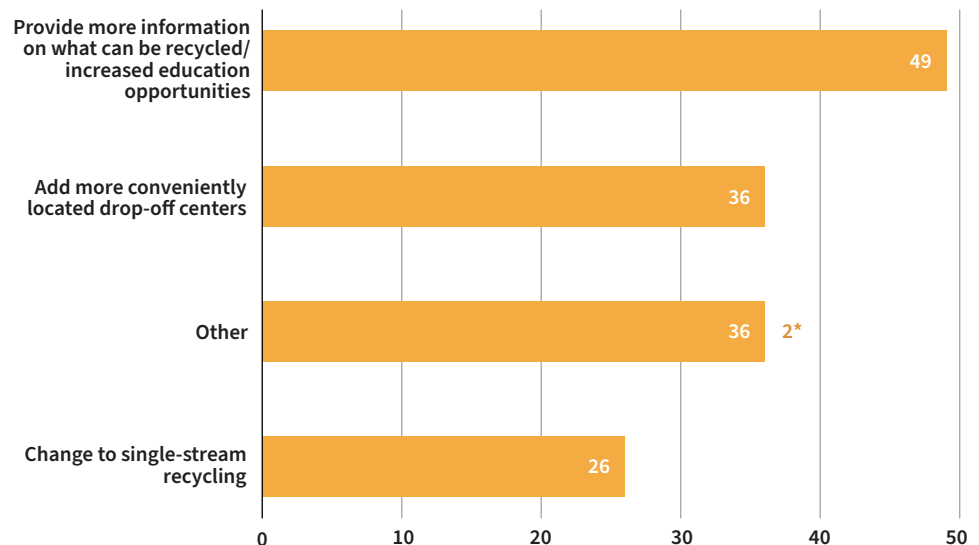

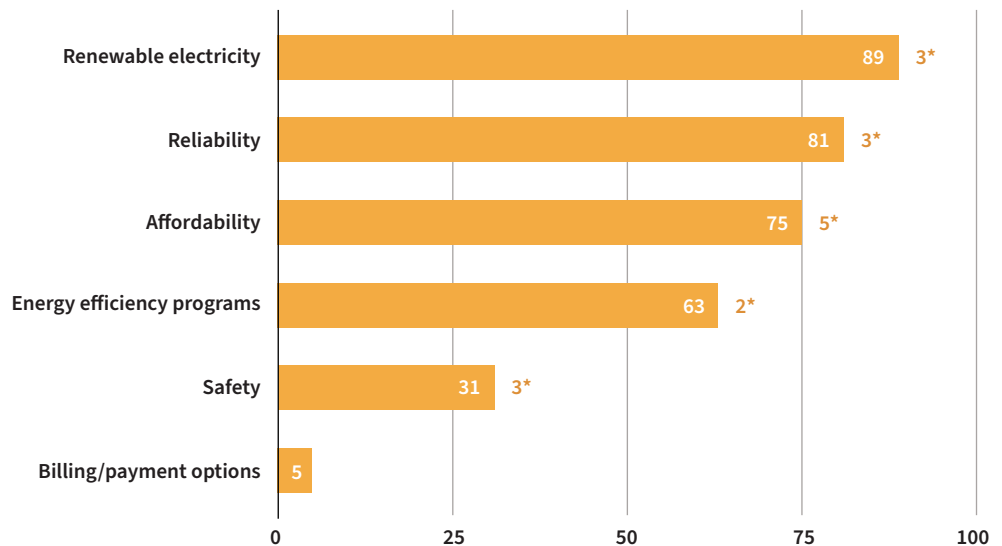

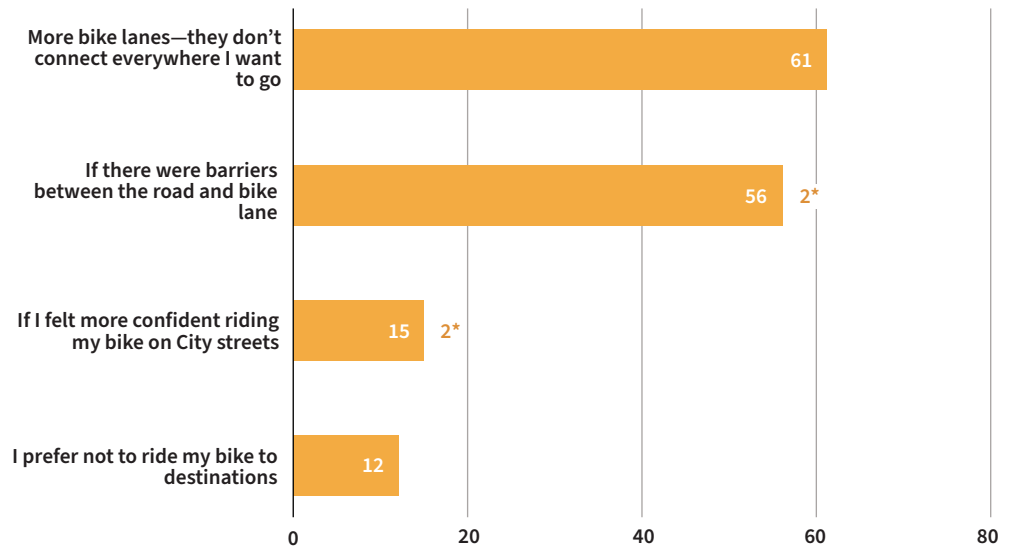

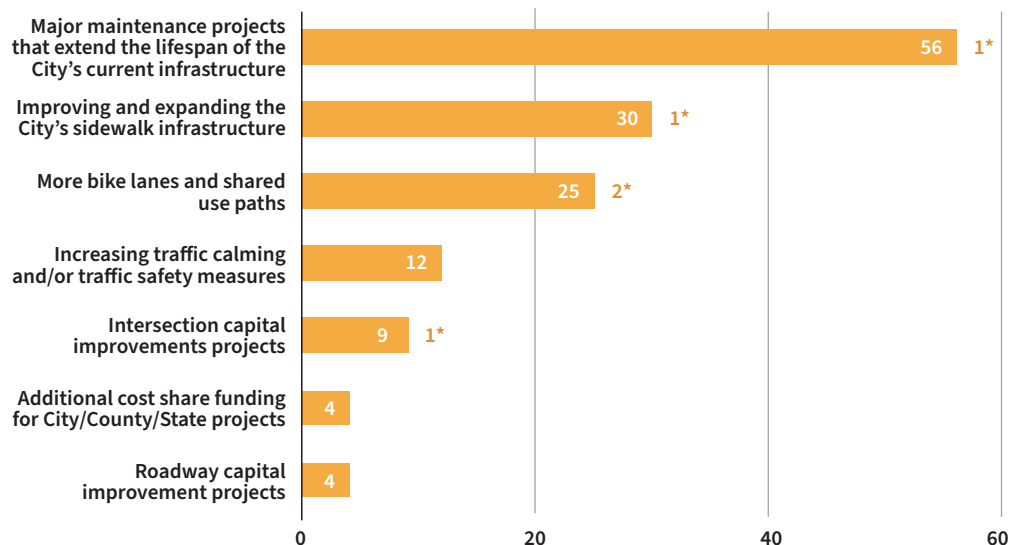
