I attended the IP meeting onon April 22 regarding the traffic calming proposal for East Walnut. Following are my comments:

The average vehicle speed on East Walnut far exceeds what is safe. Although I view speed humps as a band-aid approach rather than a solution, I support the installation of them on this stretch of road east of Old 63 for whatever benefit they may provide. This portion of East Walnut is heavily used by residents, daycare/school patrons and park users.

There are many pedestrians crossing East Walnut to enter Stephens Lake Park but this project does not address those concerns.

Because of the high rates of speed on both East Walnut and Old 63 I'm requesting that a "stop bar" and crosswalk be added to that intersection. The value of strategically placed paint far exceeds the labor and material costs of application and adds an important visual reminder for drivers.


Pedestrian Infrastructure should be implemented to calm car speeds

Alternatives to Speed Humps/Tables

Given the nature of East Walnut (not a through road, relatively low traffic, residential in nature) and given the beauty of the park that adjoins it, speed humps/tables seem an unappealing option. If the road width is adequate, chicanes would be much more aesthetically pleasing, would better integrate with the landscaping and character of the area, and would be at least as effective as speed humps or tables.
