Has anyone of local, regional, or national historic note ever occupied the property? If so, whom?

L.M. Price, a Columbia attorney, World War I veteran, and founding member of the Columbia Country Club, originally built the house with his wife Matilda. His son Al, who grew up in the house, later became Owner and President of Boone County National Bank. The Price family remained in the home until sometime in the late 1970s. Philip McAdams, a local businessman, purchased the home from the Price's and lived here until his death in 1989. After McAdams death, Rebecca Fahrendorm, inherited the house and lived here with her family for a few years until selling the home to Dale and Sue Creech. Dale Creech, former CEO of MFA Oil, owned the home for approximately 20 years and sold it to local businessman Jack Miller and his wife Karin in 2016.

Does the property have any notable or unusual architectural qualities? If so, please identify.

The home was originally designed with a Mediterranean feel accompanied by a clay tile roof which was removed at some point in the past. The outside material continues to be a concrete stucco finish as originally designed. In 2016, the current owners returned the outside color to the original color detailed in the 1924 architectural design standards.

Have any recent renovations been performed that have helped restore the property? If so, describe them briefly.

The current owners embarked on a major restoration of the property when they originally purchased the property in 2016. Original knob and tube wiring was removed and the home has been nearly completely redone protecting the original design and integrity of the home while making needed updates for a modern family.

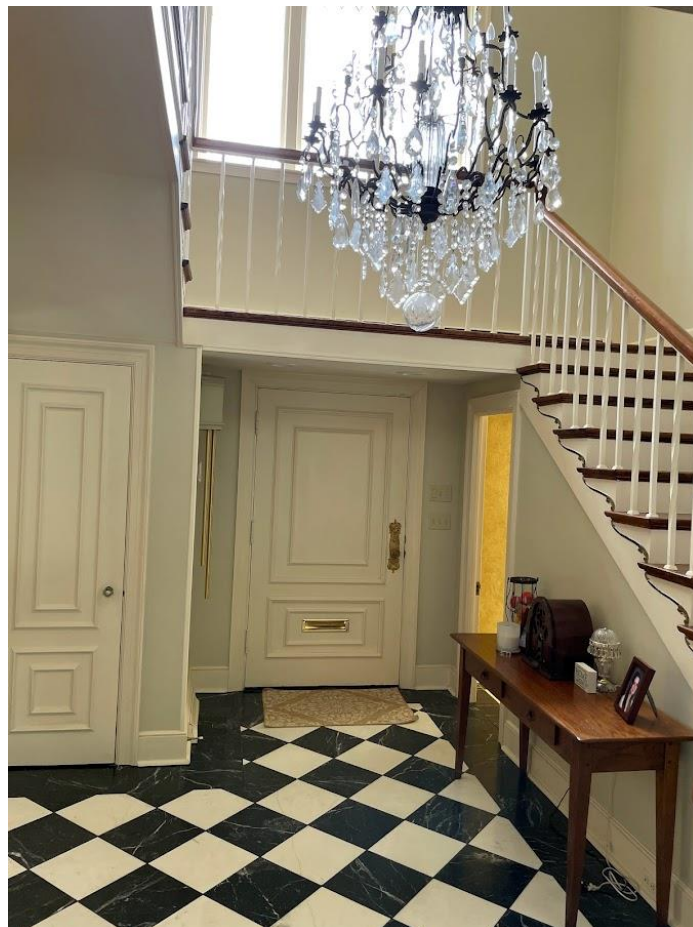
