


- Literally homeless



Home, Together.

Home. Because we know that the only true end to homelessness is a safe and stable place to call home.

Together. Because the causes of homelessness are complex, and the solutions are going to take all of us working together, doing our parts, strengthening our communities.

VISION

Every community must have a systemic response in place that ensures homelessness is prevented whenever possible, or if it can't be prevented, it is a rare, brief, and one-time experience.

This requires that every community must have the capacity to:

- Quickly identify and engage people at risk of and experiencing homelessness.
- Intervene to prevent people from losing their housing and divert people from entering the homelessness services system.
- Provide people with immediate access to shelter and crisis services without barriers to entry if homelessness does occur.
- Quickly connect people experiencing homelessness to housing assistance and services tailored to their unique needs and strengths to help them achieve and maintain stable housing.

Coordinated Entry

Systematic approach to ending homelessness:

- Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
- By name (prioritization) list
- Common assessment tool to determine risk
- Prioritize resources for the most vulnerable homeless
- Case conferencing
- Continuous Improvement

Functional Zero Task Force

Local homeless coalition dedicated to ending homelessness using a housing first and coordinated entry approach.

- Large coalition of human services, housing, and healthcare providers
- Meet every two weeks for collaboration and case conferencing
- Utilize a continuous improvement approach to solving issues

Public Housing and Housing Choice Vouchers

Provide decent, safe, and affordable housing for low-income people and play a critical role in reducing homelessness.

- Housing Choice Voucher Program (formerly known as "Section 8") Provides vouchers to low-income households to help them pay for housing in the private market, has been found to sharply reduce homelessness.
- Public housing is federally-funded housing that is rented at subsidized rates to eligible low-income families, the elderly, and persons with disabilities.

Permanent Supportive Housing

Long-term rental assistance and supportive services. It is targeted to individuals and families with chronic illnesses, disabilities, mental health issues, or substance use disorders, who have experienced long-term or repeated homelessness. Includes:

- Subsidized housing to help people who are low income maintain stable housing
- Intensive case management to help clients maintain their housing
